**Councillor Geo. Thompson Repu-
diates them.**

MR. BOLAND, REEVE BY ACCLAMATION—
CONTESTS IN WARDS 3 AND 4 ONLY.

Artemesia will at this municipal elec-
tion have a competition in two wards
only. Mr. Boland was elected to the
reeveship by acclamation, as was also
Mr. Kells to the council board. The
nominations as received by Clerk Bell-
say were as follows:

Of the above Dr. Christie retired from
contesting the reeveship, and Mr. Hill
from contesting ward 2, and it is also
thought that Mr. McLeod will not be in
the fight in ward 1, or Mr. Stewart in
ward 3. Neither gentlemen was present
to give their decision on the matter.

The afternoon meeting was a rouser,
the town hall being thoroughly packed
with a very inquisitive audience. Mr.
John Hazard occupied (not filled mind
you) the chair. The reeve was the first
called upon and gave a very clear and en-
teresting account of his stewardship in
township and county matters, explaining
and clearing up many misconceptions
which had got afloat with regard to com-
missions charged, etc. He thought the
police trustees of the village of Fleshert-
on should be required to hand in a
statement of their expenditure as other
bodies did. The county council session
had been cut down to five days and they
would get it down to four. The whole
business could be done, he said, even in
three days. The watchword was re-
trenchment in county council matters.
In reply to questions regarding the Eu-
genia bridge, which appeared to be a sore
spot to many, he explained matters, as
we believe, thoroughly to the satisfaction
of all present.

Dr. Christie followed and attacked the
expenditure as shown by the treasurer's
statement. There were very many things
about it which he could not understand,
owing to the manner in which it was
made out. It was not sufficiently in de-
tail. Anything, however, which was not
clear, was afterwards explained by the
reeve and councillors interested.

Mr. McMullen, Mr. Kells and Mr.
Hill followed. Mr. Hill was for severe
retrenchment and appeared to have the
idea that everybody was trying to "get
on top" of him, as he expressed it. He
did not propose to run and only got up
to express his ideas on the financial aspect
of affairs.

Mr. Best then warmly defended any
expenditure he had made, and defied any-
one to point to a single instance where
he had not got good value for his work.

Mr. Boyd, as became a new candidate,
was modest in his pretensions. He
thought an improvement could be made
and was willing to sacrifice himself to
that end.

There appears to be a warm feeling be-
tween the candidates in ward 4, and the
fight will be a hot one. Mr. Pedlar
states that at a Patron meeting at which
there were thirty electors Mr. Thompson
and himself agreed to abide by the de-
cision of the meeting, which gave Mr.

Pedlar ten of a majority. Mr Thompson
says this was with a proviso that those
outside of the Patrons did not wish him
to run. This Mr. Pedlar does not admit.
After a little cross firing on this point
Mr. Thompson announced that he was
"done with the Patrons," and would be
elected on his merits if at all. This
brought the meeting to a close, and a
more interesting meeting was never held
here. There appeared to be a sentiment
prevailing that the council of the past
year had been too lavish in their expendi-
ture, but so near as The Advance can
judge the individual members all came
out of the very trying ordeal of fault-
finding with flying colors, and justified
themselves to the satisfaction of all. As
we have said, the meeting was a very in-
quisitive one. But this is as it should
be, and exhibits well the praiseworthy
fact that the electors of the township
take a deep interest in its welfare.
