County Council.

Condensed from the Times.

County Council met in Owen Sound on Tuesday of last week. Mr. Binnie, of Guelph, was elected to the Warden's chair. After appointing a committee to strike standing committees council adjourned until

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

The standing committees were appointed. The following communications and memorials were read and referred to their respective committees: Letter from A. E. Cameron, of Durham, making application to be appointed county student at the agricultural college at Guelph; letter from Judge Cressor, asking that the Judges room be renovated in the spring; letter from Mrs. Saddler, thanking the council for granting her the half yearly salary of her deceased father; communication from the Owen Sound Board of Education, asking for date to confer with the Education Committee, re maintenance of Collegiate; circular with draft of the memorial from single tax association; letter from Jas. Allan, ex-chairman of County Property Committee, re work; letter from Robt. Morrow, asking for increase in price paid for stone; petition from trustees of Chatsworth school to have the entrance and leaving examinations conducted at Chatsworth; circular from Good Roads Association; presentment of Grand Jury at December sessions; letter from Judge Cressor, Chairman of Judicial Board of Audit; statement of non-resident land fund from county treas; statement of South Grey Electoral Division Agricultural Society for 1894; communication from Prisoners' Aid Association of Ontario; petitions from citizens of Meaford, Thorbury, Markdale, and Owen Sound, re classification of prisoners and building house of refuge; account of D. Darby, for splitting wood at South Grey Registry Office. Application from John H. Brown for position of auditor for 1895; Report of Public School Inspector A. Grier for East Grey; Application from the clerk of the council for an increase of salary; The report of the clerk was also read.

A number of accounts were then presented and referred to their respective committees.

The warden appointed Mr. Robert Edgar as auditor and the council appointed Mr. Thos. Hanbury, Dundalk. The auditors' salaries were fixed at \$40. Mr. Smelser, of Collingwood, and Mr. J. H. Brown were elected to the judicial board of audit, salaries \$3 per day and mileage. Council then adjourned until Thursday.

County and District.

Up to Saturday last the G. T. R., had delivered to the Collingwood Meat Company 200 tons of pork, live stock and carcasses. This is for the month of January only, so that some idea may be formed of what is being done. On Saturday the first shipment of bacon for the Liverpool market was made. About a hundred tons of products have been shipped to other points.—Enterprise.
