County and District.

Michal Ryan, of Proton, delivered a load of oats at the Mt. Forest elevator that panned out 142 bushels.

On Wednesday evening last the express from Owen Sound struck a horse above the skew crossing, Orangeville, and cut it to pieces. The iron step was pulled off the mail car and the step of the baggage car was slightly broken.

Mrs. Wm. Whitmore, of the 10th con. of Minto, is the owner of a hen that brought out a brood of chickens on the 23rd of January, which are doing well. The old hen located herself in the cattle stable which is quite warm, and accomplished a feat not often effected on the 23rd of January in Canada.

One of the most fiendish acts ever heard of in this section was perpetrated before daylight Sunday morning at the stable of Mr. J. S. Woods, milkman, on Sligo road. Previous to the husband coming home to dinner the people attending on the sick thought they would play a joke on him, so placing the three children in bed with the fellow's wife, persuaded him to believe she had had triplets. When the fun was over, and the matter explained, the nurses found it impossible to separate the babies as they could not tell the difference between the three so as to give each mother her own. The difficulty had not been got over when the last mail left.

The obsequies were conducted according to the Workman's ritual, the deceased having been a member of that Order. He was an Orangeman also and many of the latter helped to swell the cortege.—Chronicle.

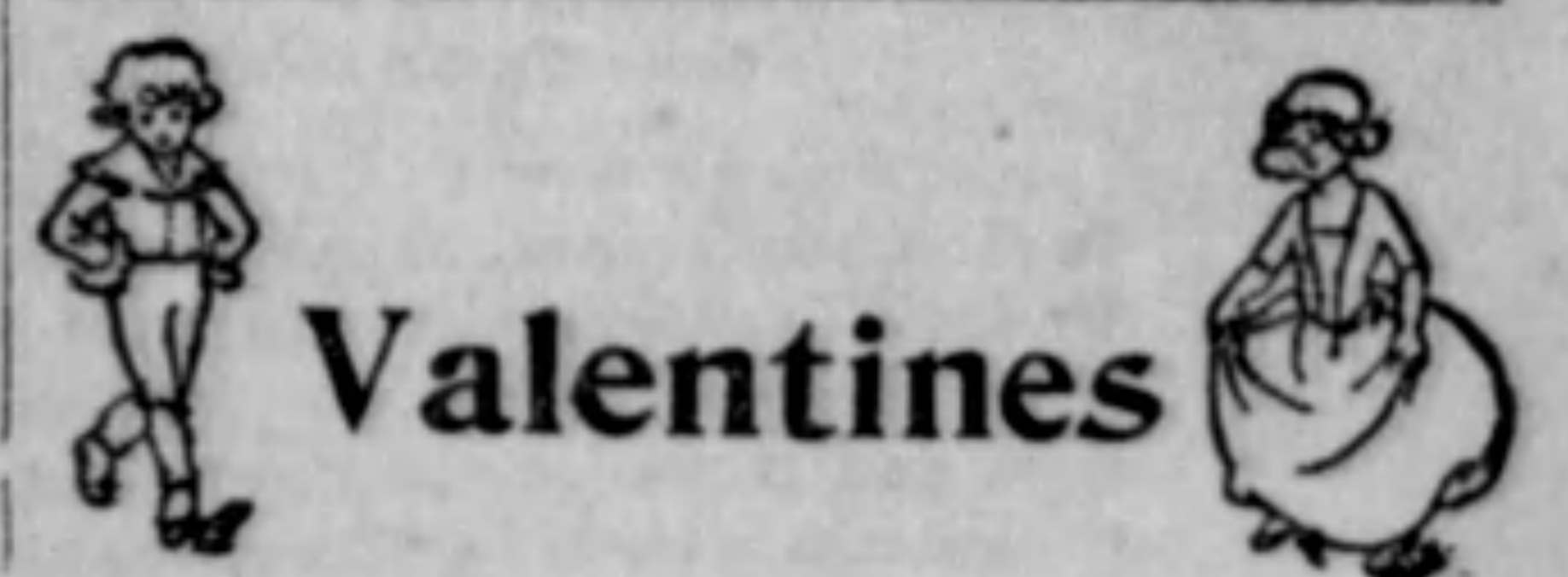
