Patron Meeting.

The open meeting of the Springhill Patrons of Industry was a decided success considering the state of the roads. As it was the school was well filled with an enthusiastic audience, with the exception of a couple of noisy Tories who can find fault outside but when asked to publicly explain their grievances against the Patrons, were dumb. They are no use when facts and figures are laid before them. The speakers were Messrs. Allen, Jamieson and Wright. Splendid music was furnished by Messrs. Pedlar, Thistlewaite and Mrs. Buskin. Mr. Allen was the first speaker. He said he was formerly a Conservative but was now a Patron, and upon the Patron platform he intended to stand or fall. Mr. Allen is not a loud and boisterous speaker but he is firm, full of sound common sense, and will, we believe, make a firm fight in the coming election. Among his many arguments he claimed a time should be set for the government to go to the country and not spring an election when they thought their chances were the best. Mr. Jamieson held the audience in wrapt attention for an hour and a half, dealing heavy blows on the government for their extravagance. He said under the depression of hard times farmers, tradesmen (and printers too) had to economize to live within their means, but to the contrary, the different governments were increasing their expenditure year after year. He dealt very hard with the pension system as carried on at present; many being pensioned merely to let some good supporter have a snap; also with the cost of members while at Ottawa. He had a whole pile of facts and figures and defied any man to contradict them. Mr. Wright said the government could not help the low prices, but they could help by paying less salaries, hiring less servants and pay for their own wines and cigars. After an instructive meeting all joined in singing God save the Queen.—Com.
