### Spring Assizes.

The assizes opened at 2.30 p. m. Tuesday, Chief Justice Robertson presiding. His Lordship addressed the jury and congratulated them on the happy state of affairs in this county. There were no criminals in the goal awaiting trial, and in accordance with the usual custom, he had received a pair of white kid gloves from the sheriff. But there was another side to the picture. There were 38 incarcerated in the goal, 30 of whom were vagrants. Some were very old, their ages being 85, 72, 63, 70, 76, 76. This was a melancholly picture. It was not because they were guilty of a crime, but because they were old, infirm and helpless and had no friends. They were sent to herd with criminals and their condition, therefore, was deplorable. There was no excuse for this sort of thing. The Ontario government offered great inducements for municipalities to establish poorhouses. There were only 36 poorhouses in Ontario. The government gave \$4000 for the erection of a house. The law provides that if one county does not feel inclined to erect a poorhouse, two or three counties might erect one. If the jury would bring in any recommendation about the matter, he would see that it would be looked after. He hoped they would take some action in the matter. He explained the law regarding Grand Juries. The number was reduced from 24 jurors to 12. This was the first jury he had addressed under the new law.

The case of Hetherington vs. Sarawak was postponed by consent on account of the illness of an important witness.

Bluhm v. Schultz was an action for slander. The parties are Germans and live in the township of Sullivan. The plaintiff, Mrs. Bluhm, alleged that the defendant had accused her of unchastity and of circulating reports damaging to her character. A verdict was given for the defendant, Messrs. Tucker & Paterson appeared for plaintiff and MacKay and Hutton for the defendant.

Tisdale v. Waterloo Mutual Ins. Co.—Transferred to Orangeville, owing to the absence of witness, defendant paying costs of the day. MacKay & Hutton for plaintiff, and W. R. Riddle, Q. C., of Toronto, for defendant.

Brown v. Henry—An action for balance of account on apple deal. Settled out of court. MacKay & Hutton for plaintiff, and L. K. Murton, of Oshawa, for defendant.

Turner v. Gunn—An action for wages. The plaintiff is a boy from the Marchmont Home, Belleville, and had been raised by Mr. Gunn. He asked for \$322. The defendant claimed that the boy had been used as one of the family and was not capable of doing much work. The plaintiff alleged that he had been ill treated and had left in consequence. Verdict for plff. of \$170, or less \$80 deducted for clothing. Tucker & Paterson for plaintiff and Kilbourn & Kilbourn for defendant.—Times.
