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**THE REMEDIAL ORDER.**

The remedial order in the Manitoba school case, as granted by the Dominion Cabinet, was signed by the Governor General on Thursday last and forwarded to the Manitoba government. The order, after reciting the complete case from the beginning, and the minority rights attacked by legislation since 1890, specifies as follows:

"(a) The right to build, maintain, equip, manage, conduct and support Roman Catholic schools in the manner provided for by the said statutes which were repealed by the two acts of 1890 aforesaid.

"(b) The right to share proportionately in any grant made out of the public funds for the purposes of education.

"(c) The right of exemption of such Roman Catholic schools from all payment or contribution to the support of any other schools.

"And his Excellency the Governor-General in Council was further pleased to declare and decide, and it is hereby declared, that it seems requisite that the system of education embodied in the two acts of 1890 aforesaid shall be supplemented by a Provincial act or acts which will restore to the Roman Catholic minority the said rights and privileges of which such minority has been so deprived as aforesaid, and which will modify the said acts of 1890 so far, and so far only, as may be necessary to give effect to the provisions restoring the rights and privileges in paragraphs a b and c hereinbefore mentioned.

"Whereof the Lieut.-Governor of the Province of Manitoba for the time being and the Legislature of the said Province and all persons whom it may concern are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Manitoba has not, at time of writing, been heard from, but it is presumed that she will still differ from Mr. John J. McGee et al as to the "requisite" of doing anything of the kind hinted at, although, of course, it is within the region of possibility that she may agree. But in the event of her refusal the Dominion Parliament, which meets on April 18 next, will be obliged to take some further action on the question. What will that action be? It is impossible to foretell. The question will undoubtedly be thoroughly threshed out before anything is done one way or the other. If this paper were to hazard a guess it would be that the Manitoba school question will not receive its quietus this session. We do not believe the government as at present constituted will pass a law forcing Manitoba to comply. The Protestant majority looks upon the matter as not of vital importance to the Catholic minority, itself, but interesting the hierarchy alone, and therefore do not admit that it would be an undue exercising of might to refuse such legislation. We believe there are sufficient members in the House of Commons who look upon it in this light, and understand that this is the sentiment of their constituents, to prevent the passing of such legislation at the coming session. Of course this is simply an editorial forecast and must go for what it is worth. There is nothing "inspired" about it.

It will be difficult for all the lawyers in the country, should they combine, to persuade the rank and file of the people of Ontario (which, by the way, is a large factor in the matter) to believe that the sister province of Manitoba should be interfered with in her educational laws by outside author-

ities. That would, they believe emphatically, be an undue exercising of might of a more glaring character than that which is now under complaint.

The Dominion Parliament has been called for the despatch of business on April 18.

The Advance has learned that a Conservative meeting was to have been held in Durham on Monday last, to be addressed by Dr. Montague. The Dr. did not arrive, neither was the meeting held. We would respectfully ask the authorities over in Durham if they would not consider it wise to inform the press of the riding when future meetings of this nature are to be held? Should the funds of the association not warrant a small advertisement, no doubt the newspaper men would good naturedly announce such free of charge. We speak for ourselves.

During the past two weeks Hendershott and Welter have been convicted of murdering young Hendershott for the insurance on his life and sentenced to be hanged. The Hyams brothers have been sent up for trial for the murder of young Wells in Toronto from a similar motive. A successful American diamond crook took in our green Canadian soil last week as a peculiarly rich field for his operations, but his very first scheme was snagged by his would-be victims and he now languishes behind prison bars in Toronto. Justice appears to be in robust health and still aggressive in this Canada of ours. The "mills of the gods" grind faster here than they do in Longfellow's free and independent country, as every crook discovers after he has once placed himself in the hopper.

**Have Jim-Crowed Themselves.**

"Don," in Toronto Saturday Night, thus defines the position of the Patrons as he understands it:—"In some respects I have had considerable sympathy with the Patron order, but it is now evident that they have been steered into the Mowat camp. Who led or drove them into the fold is of no importance, though by the distribution of offices later on we will no doubt find who was the goat who toddled along ahead and induced the Patron sheep to be so easily herded. The defeat of Mr. Senn in Haldimand is suggestive of the future collapse of the order as a political factor. No doubt both the Grits and Tories worked together to obliterate Mr. Senn, who in politics was very much of a Simple Simon anyway. Both parties hate the Patrons, and though the Provincial Government cultivated them at first, fearing that they might need their support, it is evident that they now despise them and intend to crush them out of existence. In this, of course they will have the hearty support of the Opposition, who from a Conservative point of view desire the movement to be treated with contempt in the general elections which are approaching. All that is now necessary is for Sir Oliver Mowat to give offices to a few Patrons, and the whole shooting-match will become the object of public derision. It is thus that independent movements, which are the result of a popular revolt against bad government and intense partisanship, often become the laughing-stock of a community. Without doubt the Patrons have been the wooliest grazers ever brought into this town. They were captured and befooled before they got their shoes and stockings off the first night. It is very probable, indeed, that Father Mowat knew where they were before they got here. It is painful to think how the people on the concession lines and crossroads will regard the manner in which they have been lured. All that now remains is for somebody to blow out the gas on the whole crowd. A corner's inquest would not then be necessary, for men who have been such flats while alive are not worth the expense of an inquest after they are dead. Yet I believe they were honest in their intentions. They are perishing of too much statesmanship; they thought they were too smart, and their tactics have been so fine that they have almost jim-crowed themselves out of existence."
