**DOT'S CORNER.**

In the rink hall, Markdale, on Monday night there assembled one of those small but enthusiastic audiences which comprise coming on a percentage are apt to view with disfavor. Still the good humor of the Messrs Fox and Hewlett and Miss Annie Louise White who comprise the company seemed not in the least disturbed by the sparse attendance. This is a strong combination and no doubt would have drawn as large an audience as the rink could accommodate had the roads not been well nigh impassable. Mr. George Fox whose boyish face is pretty well known through the towns and cities of Canada and whose reputation as a violinist is even better known, was of course the chief drawing card. His command of this at once the most abused and exalted of instruments is something marvellous; he played whole passages in harmonies, and successions of rapid double stops with an ease that was playful. To hear him in Leonard's "Duello" (without piano accompaniment) carry two distinct parts and at the same time maintain an elaborate accompaniment of rich chords, was at once a revelation and a delight. It may be said of him as of Marteau, his playing is so easy, so graceful and so strong that those who know nothing of the violin might imagine that what he accomplishes is done more by natural ability than by serious application. This is very far from the case, for a man may have the genius of a Paganini and yet without continued discipline he can draw nothing but discordant sounds from the four strings.

With the piano and organ it is entirely different, for even a child has the aid of sight and the fingers of both hands to assist him in making the instrument speak with delicacy and power. He has also the breadth of keys nearly an inch wide to prevent the hand from slipping to make the note either sharp or flat.

The violinist has none of these accessories, and he has only four tones of which he is sure. The others are all made by the placing of the finger upon a certain part of the string. Let this position vary the width of a hair and the tone is imperfect; even let the pressure be unequal and the tone is ruined.

Mr. Fox is a Walkerton boy and owes his proficiency to Mr. Bowman, of Hamilton whom he declares to be the best teacher in Canada. It will be remembered that Mr. Bowman was also the teacher of that other young Canadian star, Miss Nora Clench.

Mr. Fox goes to Germany next summer to begin a three years' course under Joachim, the world renowned, but will vary his studies with occasional tours through this country and the United States.

Mr. Hewlett comes not without his credentials to those who may remember his brilliant organ playing at those memorable Wednesday evening concerts in Carlton St. Methodist church some three years ago. His one piano solo on Monday evening was the acme of delicacy, light, tripping and tender, and many were the expressions of regret that he was not to appear again in the role of soloist; though in the not less important and perhaps rarer role of an able accompanist he was heard to advantage many times during the evening, in fact Mr. Fox wonders how he should play to anyone else's accompaniment. Mr. Hewlett not only occupies his old position of organist in Carlton St. church but is a teacher of the piano in the Conservatory of Music.

Perhaps the heaviest part of a rich programme fell to the lot of Miss Annie Louise White, of New York, who provided no less than nine numbers besides an encore. Miss White has a face of the grand dark type, suggestive of tragic possibilities, so one is agreeably surprised by her versatility when she bursts into fun and frolic. Her two best numbers were "He is Late," "The Husking Bee," which latter was written for her. Accompanied on the piano, she is alternately the old fiddler "calling off" at a country dance and the rustic youth or maiden romping through the figures. But when I say Miss White is seen to most advantage in rollicking fun, I must not forget her rendition of Longfellow's "The Legend Beautiful," which fully exemplified her purely artistic sensibilities. Miss White is a New Yorker for generations back, if one may so express it, and it is hardly to be wondered at if she believes herself justified in saying that the greatest advantages of the continent are to be had there. She seems very well pleased by the reception accorded her by the Canadian people in this her second tour through Canada and meets the most trying incidents of her professional life with a smiling face.
