#### Priceville.

Another meeting in the interest of the proposed cheese factory was held in Bolger's hall last Friday evening. After a good deal of speechifying it was finally decided that Mr. Stewart and others thoroughly canvass the various routes in order to obtain if possible the promise of the requisite number of cows to start a factory. The next drawback to the success of the project is that Mr. Stewart will not consent to build a factory unless the farmers bind themselves to support the factory for three years, and as a great many are unwilling to put themselves under such an obligation, it is to be feared that the establishing of such an industry will be a failure for this year at least. However, we trust that success will attend the efforts of the promoters. We cannot see why it is necessary to bind anyone for more than a year, for if it pays well the farmers will not fail to support it next season.

#### An Unknown Race Discovered.

LONDON, April 21—Great interest is displayed in the revelation made by W. M. Flinders Petrie at Edinburgh this week that in excavating in the district between Geblin and Abydos last year remains were found of a hitherto unknown race of people whom he is disposed to identify with the Amorites. In one of their towns which has been unearthed about north of Thebes, nearly 2,000 graves were opened. Not a single scarab, amulet or other Egyptian object was found, and the bodies, instead of being mummified and stretched at full length, were buried in a sitting posture, with knees bent to the shoulders, and all facing the west. They were a large and powerful people, many over six feet in height, with brown wavy hair, prominent aquiline nose, and development suggesting that they were mountaineers. They seem also to have been cannibals. Though there is no sign of alphabet or hieroglyphics, they were well advanced in the use of metals, and had better and more artistic pottery than the Egyptians, though all hand-made, showing that the potter's wheel was unknown to them. This unlooked-for appearance of a new factor in the problem of our oldest civilization has naturally made a deep impression in scientific circles, and there is eager curiosity on all sides to know more of it. It is supposed that these graves date from about the seventh dynasty, or 3,000 years B. C., and that these were the people who overran Egypt under the Hyksos or shepherd kings.
