Hendershott and Welter Must Hang.

Deputy Attorney General Cartwright has carefully gone over the evidence taken at the trial of Duncan Hendershott and W. D. Welter, sentenced to be executed at St. Thomas on June 18 for the murder of the former's nephew, and has decided to refuse the application of the counsel for the prisoners for a new trial. Mr. Cartwright has given the matter the fullest attention and reviewed the various points submitted by the counsel, and has arrived at the conclusion that the prisoners have had a fair and impartial trial and he sees no reason whatever why a new trial should be granted.

The only hope left for the accused now is the commutation of their sentence to imprisonment for life, which has been applied for from the Deputy Minister of Justice. In view of the nature of the crime, it is highly improbable that the commutation will be granted, and the law will probably be allowed to take its course.

The condemned men have commenced to show signs of weakening. Particularly is this the case with Hendershott, who is growing very uneasy as the time of execution draws near. He sleeps very little, and passes the long nights in walking about his narrow cell, occasionally reading.

Both prisoners seemed much affected when told that Chatelle had been executed at Stratford. The only impression made upon them by any visiting clergyman was by Messrs. Crossley and Hunter, the evangelists. They still read the Bible continuously, and an effort will now be made to prepare them for the fate which awaits them.

At Sault Ste. Marie the operations of the Canadian canal have been ordered to report for duty this week. This indicates that the lock will be in operation in thirty days.

While assisting at a barn-raising near Harrison Mr. Finlay McLeod was thrown from the building by some of the timber breaking and received injuries from which he died.

The 15-year-old daughter of Walter Hunter, Mulmur township, was accidentally shot dead by a 15-year-old lad, who was handling a loaded rifle. The charge struck her in the forehead and passed out at the back of the head. She fell dead.

A strange incident occurred on the farm of Wm. H. Chown, Fullarton, lately. About six weeks ago he had a ewe which gave birth to a lamb, and on May 10 the same sheep gave birth to two more lambs. The first lamb was apparently healthy, but it was trampled on by its mother and killed about a week after its birth. The other two are strong and healthy.

Another blessing of a like nature occurred a year after—both girls—and the happy father called them Kate and Duplicate. But the latest birth of twins has been a puzzler to him for a time—as one was a boy and the other a girl. However, the difficulty has been got over by calling the boy Max and the girl Climax.—Morden Monitor.

A sad fatality occurred at White's planing mill, Nobleton, lately. It appears the fifteen-year-old son of Mr. Robt. White was putting a belt on the pulleys, by means of a rope, while they were in motion. Immediately the belt caught on the pulleys, it drew the rope and the unfortunate lad with it. Hearing the noise the workmen ran to the engine room where they found the governor had come off and the engine was running at random. The remains of the poor child were found all over the room as the body was torn to atoms.

The Trent Valley canal comprises Lake Simcoe, Balsam, Cameron, Sturgeon, Pigeon, Buckhorn, Stoney, Clear and Rice lakes, and when completed will save a distance from Sault Ste. Marie to Kingston of 765 miles. It begins at Matchedash on the Georgian Bay, and outlets at Trenton. Its entire length when completed will be 204½ miles, of which 164 miles is now completed and navigable, leaving only 58½ miles. Of this 30 miles is now under contract, leaving only 28½ miles to let.

Mr. Wm. J. Jackson of the east back line, Holland, about two miles from Berkley, met with a serious accident on Monday last from which he lies in a critical condition. He had been hauling out manure from the barnyard, and about 4 o'clock p. m. he was found lying in an unconscious condition. It is thought that the wagon wheel had struck the gate post while returning from the field, throwing him forward among the horses' feet. Dr. Ego was immediately sent for to Markdale and arrived in about an hour, and on his arrival Jackson was just regaining consciousness. His skull was found to be fractured, the wound having the appearance of being caused by the kick of a horse. Mr. Jackson cannot remember anything of the accident or how it occurred and it is thought that he must have fallen forward from the wagon and been trampled upon or else kicked by one of the horses.—Standard.
