On Thursday evening of last week while assisting at a barn raising for Mr. John Hewitt, in Holland, north of Berkley, Mr. Richard Lyons met with an accident from which he is not expected to recover. The frame was up and the rafters being put in position. Mr. Lyons stood on the ground assisting to shove up the rafters, and after pushing one as far as he could reach with a piece of board and while still looking up, the rafter slipped from the grasp of those above and dropped striking him on the forehead and injuring his spine so that he is since lying at Mr. Hewitt's, fully conscious but otherwise in a paralyzed condition. Drs. Ego and Bull were summoned and did all that medical aid could for his relief but the chances for recovery, are we regret to say, not encouraging.—Standard.

James Grant, a laborer, has been committed to gaol by Messrs. Thos. Gamey, M. P. P., ex-reeve of Osprey, and D. K. Preston, reeve of the township, acting in their magisterial capacity. Grant arrived at the gaol yesterday in a truly deplorable condition. He is sick and poor, suffering from a badly swollen leg, quite unable to walk, and in a filthy condition. He had to be carried into the building, being utterly unable to navigate by himself. The representatives of the township of Osprey have always opposed the foundation of a house of refuge. Mr. Gamey, who was reeve of the township for years, was one of the most uncompromising opponents of the scheme; and at the recent June session, when a division was taken on Mr. Palmer's motion, declaring that the time had come to establish such an institution, Mr. Preston and both his deputies voted nay. Mr. Preston thereupon returns home and commits a person to jail for six months, who is certainly a fit subject, if there ever was one, for a house of refuge with an infirmary attached. The position of those who uncompromisingly oppose any action in the direction of establishing a home for the infirm and old, whose only crime is their poverty, seems to be becoming more inconsistent and illogical every day.—O. S. Times.
