The Glorious Twelfth

CELEBRATED IN FITTING STYLE AT FLESHERTON STATION.

The glorious Twelfth, of immortal memory, was celebrated at Flesherton station by the lodges of Artemesia district, joined by Kimberley and Feversham. The good people of the station had made excellent preparation for a large crowd. There were several magnificent arches erected, two of which were especially fine double arches.

The procession started from the Orange Hall and consisted of the following lodges, marshalled by Mr. T. B. Carruthers of Kimberley on a milk white war horse: Kimberley, Eugenia, Markdale, Kells, Fourth Line, Orange Valley, Feversham, Flesherton L.O.L. and Y.M.P.B.A., and Flesherton Station. The procession marched to Mackenzie's grove, just west of the Station, where short speeches were delivered by Messrs. F. T. Carr, John Lyons and Dr. Christie. The speeches were interspersed with some excellent music by Flesherton band, which also headed the Y.M.P.B.A.'s in the procession. The day threatened rain, which, however, did not amount to much, more than to make the atmosphere cool and pleasant. About six or seven hundred people were present. The crowd dispersed early after spending a very pleasant day.
