The council of Osprey met in the Orange Hall, Feversham, on Monday, August 19th. The members all present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and signed. Communications were read from W. H. Thurston, bills \$51.65, printing voters' list and stationery, and bill \$3.70, collectors' rolls; from county clerk, statement of county rates; petition from ratepayers of McIntyre vicinity asking aid for Mrs. McArthur, an indigent; petition from Irwin Morrison and others asking a grant to open and repair 30th sideroad between cons. 8 and 10; petition from a number of ratepayers of 12th con. asking aid for Philip Ottawell, an indigent; from H. W. Pedler, bill 80 cts., repairing a plow and pick; petition from Richard Hawton and others asking a grant to open 25th sideroad, cons. 11 and 12; from county treasurer, tax sale list for 1895.

sue his order for \$3 in favor of Mrs. McArthur, as charity, and that Malcolm Cameron expend the amount. Carried.

Clark—Speers—That Donald McDermid be paid \$25 for work done on deviation road, lots 30 and 31, con. 14. Carried.

Allen—Monaghan—That W. H. Thurston be paid \$51.65 for printing Voters' list and other printing. Carried.

Speers—Allen—That Philip Ottawell receive \$5 as charity, John Speers to expend the amount for him. Carried.

Clark—Speers—That John Blackwell receive \$5 as charity and Thos. Freethy expend the amount for him. Carried.

Clark—Speers—That this council grant \$1 as an equivalent to every gratis day's work as now subscribed on a certain petition presented to this council on this date to open and repair the 30th sideroad between cons. 8 and 10 when such gratis work is certified to by Irwin Morrison and Robt. Milligan. Carried.

Monaghan—Clark—That W. H. Thurston be paid \$3.70 for collector's rolls. Carried.

Clark—Allen—That Allen Campbell be paid \$3 for gravel supplied to road division No. 29 for the year 1893. Carried.

Speer—Allen—That H. W. Pedlar be paid 80 cents for repairing pick and plow. Carried.

Clark—Speers—That the clerk notify John Banerman to stop drawing stones into a gravel pit opposite his lot, and to remove any put there by him forthwith. Carried.

Monaghan—Allen—That this council grant \$1 as an equivalent to every gratis day's work subscribed on a certain petition of this date to open 25th side road, cons. 11, and 12, when such gratis work is certified to by C. Thompson, pathmaster. Carried.

Clark—Monaghan—That Malcolm Cameron be allowed 7 days' statute labor for trespass road through his fields in the winter of 1894 and 1895. Carried.

Bylaw No. 329, to assess and levy rates for county, township and public school purposes for the current year, was read its several times and filled up in committee of the whole. This bylaw requires a rate of six mills on the whole assessment to meet the requirements, as follows: County rate, \$1,567.50; school equivalent, \$403; general school rate, per section 109, school act, \$1,108; township purposes, \$1,725.

Bylaw No. 330, appointing James Elliott collector of rates for north half and Duncan McInnes for south half at a salary of \$50 each, received its several readings and passed.

Speers—Clark—That Thos. Parks and Samuel Parks, be accepted as bondsmen for Jas. Elliott, collector for 1895. Carried.

Clark—Monaghan—That Donald McIntyre and Hector Moore be accepted as bondsmen for D. McInnes, collector for 1895. Carried.

Council adjourned to meet at McIntyre on Oct. 21st next.

Artemesia Council.

This council met in the Town Hall on Monday, Sept. 2nd, 1895, at the call of the reeve, for the despatch of business. There were present: John Boland, Esq., reeve; and councillors McMillan, Kells and Best. The minutes of last session were read and confirmed. Estimates from trustees of S. S. No. 3 and separate school, and from the clerk of Euphrasia, trustees' estimates U.S.S. No. 1, Artemesia and Euphrasia. Bylaw No. 516 amending bylaw 515 to appoint collectors for 1895, was introduced and passed, appointing Dugald McCormack, collector for ward No. 1, instead of John Hazard, deceased. Report of D. McMillan, commissioner ward No. 1, on special expenditure was presented. A post card from David Smith complaining of bridge on 30

sideroad, con. 10, being in a dangerous condition.

Kells—McMillan—That bylaws 514 and 515 be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed in bylaw book. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That Arthur Johnston be paid \$2.15 for 43 loads of gravel supplied pathmaster, R. R. Smith, said pathmaster having vouched for the correctness of this bill. Carried.

Kells—Best—That John Teeter be paid \$3 for 64 loads of gravel supplied to W. J. Cargo, pathmaster for roads. Carried.

Kells—Best—That commissioner of ward 1, having completed his work, as per resolution of council, amounting to \$283.25, be paid commission on same at 8 per cent., amounting to \$22.64. Carried.

Best—McMillan—That commissioner of ward 3 be and is hereby authorized to have the rough stones removed and some holes filled on the road leading from Flesherton to the station, likewise same kind of repairs at horseshoe hill. Carried.

McMillan—Kells—That the collectors of wards 2, 3 and 4, having filed their bonds with the clerk, this council, having examined said bonds, consider them satisfactory. Carried.

Best—McMillan—Resolved that this council place on record their deep sorrow and regret at the loss this township has sustained in the sudden demise of the late John Hazard, who has collected the taxes of ward one of this township for 17 years, always performing his duties in a straightforward, honorable and intelligent manner. Carried.

Adjourned to meet 1st Monday in November, 1895.

A Bab Road Job.

To the Editor of The Advance.

DEAR SIR.—Recently a job of \$39 was passed by two road commissioners, one from Osprey and one from Artemesia; that is both rough and incomplete if not dangerous. If the job fills the terms of contract (?) then they were insufficient; if it does not, the order for payment should have been withheld until the job was finished in a workmanlike manner.

In similar cases I would suggest to road commissioners that a specification of what is required should be deposited in some public place and tenders invited therefor with security for performance of contract.
