A Clever Capture

Mr. Thos. Cantlon of Arthur township was returning home late Thursday night and noticed a buggy track leading out of his brother's place at a point where the fence wire had been cut or broken. This aroused his suspicion and he notified his brother. Upon going to the stable they found a horse and buggy gone, with the tracks of two men leading to the stable. Hurriedly starting in pursuit they proceeded to Bell's corners, where they procured fresh horses and continued the chase, capturing their man near the Shelburne roller flour mill. One man is believed to have become suspicious and got out of the rig just before reaching Shelburne, leaving his partner in crime to drive on. At any rate the track of a man was next morning followed down the railway track a considerable distance and then lost to view. The prisoner, who gave his name as William Thompson, and who is a man about fifty years of age, was brought before Magistrates Falconer and Hamilton Friday morning and committed to Orangeville jail to stand his trial at the next court of competent jurisdiction. The prisoner had on him when arrested four new shirts, two pair of pants and a number of silk handkerchiefs, and forty coppers and a five cent piece. These are believed to have been stolen.—Shelburne Economist.
