In early life she gave her heart to God, and has since been a member of the Presbyterian church, although for some years past she has been unable to attend public worship, but appreciated very much the assiduous attentions of her pastor, the Rev. J. Wells, M. A.

Everything possible for her comfort was done that her loving family could conceive, by whom she will be much missed. She leaves a grown up family of six daughters and two sons. The daughters are Mrs. D. Taylor and Mrs. T. Bell of Owen Sound, Mrs. T. Pearson of Washington state, Mrs. Geo. Littlejohns of Markdale and Miss Susan and Mary C. who reside at home. The sons are Roderick, who also resides at home, and T. R. of the 3rd line.

The funeral on Friday afternoon to the Presbyterian cemetery, Orange Valley, was large, notwithstanding the inclement weather.
