Obituary

Much sympathy is expressed for Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Carr in the loss of their daughter Agnes, who passed away from life on Thursday evening last after a brief illness, at the early age of 26 years. Miss Carr was a young woman who was very highly esteemed. She was a member of the Presbyterian choir and an earnest worker in church work. The members of the choir placed upon the bier a handsome wreath of cut flowers. The funeral on Saturday afternoon was very largely attended.

A memorial service was held on Sunday morning, when the pastor, Rev. J. Wells, M. A., preached an earnest and touching sermon from Philippians 1:21: "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain." At the close of the Sabbath school service the assistant superintendent, Mr. A. M. Gibson, read the following short address by the superintendent, Mr. Jos. Blackburn, who through illness was unable to be present himself:

Dear teachers and members of our Sabbath School:

It is with feelings of deep sorrow that I briefly refer this morning to the break in our ranks occasioned by the sudden death of our dear young sister, Miss Aggie Carr, who was one of our most faithful and devoted Sabbath school teachers, and who by her quiet, consistent christian life lent an influence for good and manifested much of the spirit of her Saviour whom she served and loved. We little thought on last Sabbath morning, while you were assembled studying God's word and singing His praises here below, that ere the dawn of another Sabbath she, whose spirit has taken its everlasting flight, would have gone to join the angelic choir in singing the songs of the redeemed. Her place here is vacant and we shall miss her much, but that which is our loss is her again. The work given her to do in church or school she did willingly and cheerfully and that work being finished she has entered into her rest and reward. Let us give praise and thanks to God for her fragrant young life, lent for a season; for the Lord gave and the Lord in His wisdom and love hath taken away; and now that he has called her home He has through her death been speaking to us, bidding us also be ready, "For in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh." Dear young people, God is calling—calling for your hearts—calling you to service, and those of you who by adoption are His children let me press upon you the thought that, "night cometh when no man can work," when golden opportunities will be past; let me urge you to greater diligence, to more earnest prayer, more closet prayer for the baptism of the spirit upon yourselves and the conversion of those around you who have not tasted of the sweets of redeeming love. Let me say to her young class, cherish a kindly remembrance of your departed teacher; let the words of instruction which fell from her lips live in your hearts; follow in her footsteps so far as she followed Jesus, and resolve by God's grace helping you to meet her in heaven. And now let the prayer of a united school ascend to heaven for the consolation and comfort of God's grace to abound in the hearts of her aged and grief-stricken parents.
