### County and District

Wm. McDonald, Sullivan, was killed by a large pole falling and striking him on the head.

An attempt was made to set fire to the premises of George Kingsbury, Chatsworth, last week, but was unsuccessful.

Rev. John Little of Dornoch has received a unanimous call from the Presbyterian congregation of Dutton, a thriving town on the Michigan Central R. R., at a salary of \$1100 a year and a month's holidays. He will accept.

It has been customary for the Euphrasia Agricultural Society to offer a prize to the handsomest girl on the grounds on the day of their show, and the judging was always done by parties unknown, who go through the crowds and select the winner. This year the genial secretary, Mr. J. L. Wilson, was nearly knocked off his seat by surprise, when a young and handsome sample of Euphrasia's daughters came up to him to enter in the "handsome lady class."—Reflector.

The estimated expenditure of Owen Sound Coll. Inst. for 1897 is \$11,812.50 of which \$9600 is for teachers' salaries. The estimated government and county grant is \$6440 leaving a balance of \$5,372.50 to be paid by the town. The public school estimates for next year are \$11,830 of which \$9250 is for teachers' salaries; estimated government receipts \$1275, leaving \$10,555 to be paid by the town. Taking the Coll. Inst. and public school together the cost for 1897 will be \$23,642.50. Of this amount \$15,927.50 will come directly out of the Owen Sound ratepayers' pockets. Owen Sound has a first class Coll. Inst. and public school but it takes an immense amount of money to run these institutions.—Ex.

A very sad story comes from Clavering, Keppel township. A few weeks ago a man named Fullerton, who was working in the sawmill there, took sick of typhoid fever. His wife after a few days also became ill, and a few neighbors came in and waited on them as they could spare the time from their own household cares. In a short time the man died and was removed to a neighboring house, from which the funeral left, as the wife was too ill to be made aware what was going on. Mrs. Fullerton was on a fair way to recovery, but taking a relapse died rather suddenly. Mrs. Fullerton's father had been dead but two weeks when his son became ill, making three deaths in the family within a month. Mrs. Richard Schofield, the mother of Mrs. Fullerton, has taken the two orphan children to raise.

Shallow Lake is the seat of the great portland cement works, and is a busy place these days. However, its denizens give ear to a sensation occasionally, and a recent one furnished considerable talk in that community. Mr. Geo. McKague left here about three months ago for the Soo to fill an engagement there, leaving his wife at home along with one Burton, who had been and continued to remain a boarder in the household. A fortnight ago the absent husband returned to his home to find that the house had been deserted and the effects—consisting of a clock, sideboard, bed, cook and box stoves, etc.—had gone also. The distracted husband, on coming to Owen Sound, found that the effects had been shipped from here to Brampton, and delivered at that station. Next he visited Mr. Price, J. P., with a view to lodging an information against Burton in the matter, but changed his mind on deciding to go to Brampton in person, which he did one day last week. On departing, we understand, he declared he had no intention of making up with his wife again, though he was determined to recover possession of his household effects if possible.—O. S. Star.
