Mrs. J. Runstadler was suddenly called to her parental home near Ventry during the past week to attend the sick bed of her father, Mr. Mortimer Egan. On Monday word arrived that he had passed away that morning. He was between 75 and 80 years of age. The funeral took place yesterday, Wednesday, to Melancthon R. C. cemetery.

The following extract, taken from Road Commissioner Campbell's recent address in Orillia, may interest our readers and especially our village council: "Planks are not economical material for sidewalks. Timber subjected to alternate moisture from the ground and rain and heat from the sun, cannot help but decay rapidly. A plank walk properly constructed will last five years then repairs commence. At the end of fifteen years the walk has cost as much for repairs as it cost in the first place, there-

fore the average life of a plank walk may be seven years. The best material for sidewalks is artificial stone. The first cost of this is nearly three times that of plank. Plank averages about 5c square foot; artificial stone about 12c a square foot. The latter, when properly laid will last probably for a century; it has been on some Toronto streets now for thirty years and is apparently as good as ever."

Did--In Artemesia, on Tuesday, July 26, Mrs. Wm. Blackburn, in her 80th year. Deceased was taken suddenly ill on Friday last. Her husband preceded her about eight years ago. She leaves a family of six sons and three daughters. She was a consistent member of the Presbyterian church; for over 50 years and died in full assurance of entering the glary land. She has been a resident of Artemesia since 1865. The funeral took place to Flesherton cemetery on Wednesday afternoon.

For a week past a gang of telephone men have been here putting in what is known as the metallic circuit. This may be described in short as a double wire, which does away with induction and makes conversation possible for almost unlimited distances. This system is now complete from Owen Sound to Quebec. We are informed that conversation can now be carried on with Quebec from this point as satisfactorily as with Toronto. The latest instruments have been placed in the central here, including lightning arrestors, and everything is up to date.

Dundalk is engaging a fourth teacher for their public school and Flesherton is adding the third. While strongly upholding the action of the trustees the Herald has this to say, and we wish to apply these words to our own case, because our trustees are equally guilty in respect to ignoring the home paper and home talent. Let them take the lesson to heart which the Herald reads them. "The only mistake we see is that the Board did not advertise in the Herald. Applications would certainly not have been received from all parts of the province, but what was received would have been from teachers that were personally known to the Board or Inspector Campbell. Ten applications from teachers known to the Board is better than a thousand unknown. A certainty has been thrown away for a blind chance of one out of a thousand."

A correspondent reminds us that no adequate report has been given of the garden party or lawn social held at Maxwell just previous to the Rev. Mr. Legate's departure for his Stayner charge, and hands in the following facts concerning the event: "The Farewell lawn social given the Rev. T. Legate and family just before they left Maxwell was a success, though the evening was so unfavorable. Friends gathered from the different churches of the circuit and some from quite a distance. Mr. and Mrs. M. Richardson of Flesherton added much to the evening's pleasure, also the presence of Mrs. (Rev.) Fleming, Presbyterian, and Dr and Mrs. J. A. Scott, Maxwell, gave tone and spirit to the happy crowd of young people that enjoyed themselves on the beautiful parsonage grounds. Many said good-bye with a warm shake of the hand, and a kind prayer and wish for the future welfare of the departing minister and his wife on the Stayner circuit, to which they were appointed by conference.

There is a canine Jim Brodie in this town, and he belongs to Mr. Fred Tucker, tailor. His name is Sport, and he is a little white fox terrier. Mr. Tucker has rooms in the second story of Richardson's block, and almost any day "Sport" may be seen (or at least might be seen until Monday of this week) sitting on the window sill looking down upon passers-by and talking "chin" to other low down street dogs. On Monday two curs got into a "scrap" right under his perch, and as Sport is some kind of a scraper himself he thought it too bad to be out of the fun. In the excitement of the moment he forgot that there was a stairway, or else decided that the exigencies of the case demanded haste. At all events he took a flying leap of eighteen or twenty feet out of the window and over the sidewalk. He lit on his feet all right but was in no condition to enlist in the war after striking terra firma. He had lost all interest in other dogs. No lasting damage was done, but he refuses to go near the window any more. He has decided to keep away from all temptation in future. There are human beings in this world who have done just such foolish acts as did Sport, and invariably have come to the same wise conclusion.

A lacrosse match was played at Markdale on Wednesday of last week between the Owen Sound and Markdale clubs which, for rough playing, discounted anything seen in this league. The referee is charged with allowing "slugging" on the part of the Markdale club and severely treating anything approaching it on the part of Owen Sound. Following is the Times report of the match: "The all-Ontario aggregation which masquerades under the name of the Markdale Lacrosse team, turned down the Thistle yesterday by a score of 2-1. It is hardly necessary to say that the game was a hard one as the score tells the story, but a few remarks on the general conduct of the sports to the south might not be out of place. With one or two exceptions the Markdale men played brutal lacrosse, and the crippled condition of the home team this morning shows how they were handled yesterday. No doubt the team from Markdale are anxious to emulate the Spaniards, but their game yesterday would have put a Spanish bull-fight to the blush. In about a week the locals will have recovered sufficiently from their wounds to commence practice, and when the winners of yesterday's game play the return here no doubt the score will read differently. In the meantime we would advise the Markdale team to cultivate a little true lacrosse spirit and not add to the odium of having a team of ringers that of being the most brutal team in the district."
