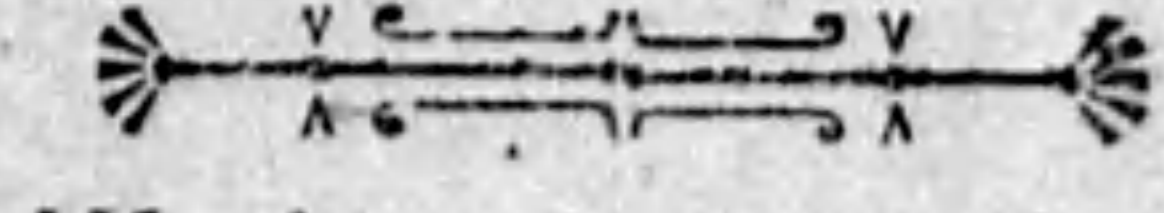

Sam was thrown out of the buggy and his head considerably cut and his leg bruised. The young lady managed eventually to get the animal stopped.

General satisfaction is expressed in this district over the grain and fruit yield, which is considered much above the average. Potatoes will be the one scarce commodity in this vicinity, and the prospects are that tubers will have to be imported from other sections where the frost was less destructive. Many farmers in Artemesia, Protton and Glenelg will not have enough potatoes for seed next year.

A VALUABLE LOT.—McFarland & Son, Markdale, have sold and shipped to Liverpool this week 647 tubs of butter, being upwards of 33,000 pounds, the cash value of which is about \$5000. This is undoubtedly the largest single shipment of butter ever made from Markdale, and speaks volumes for the very large business the firm of McFarland & Son does. We are told they still have 50 tubs choice dairy tubs in their cellar and that all this butter has been taken over their counters for goods in about 90 days. A new feature of this year's East Grey fair is a ladies Comfort Soap race, open to any lady over sixteen years of age, competitors to run ten yards, pick up a bar of Comfort soap, run another ten yards, pick up another bar, and so on until one hundred yards is run. Durham has a peculiar hotel license muddle on hand. The upper town has two hotels, the British and Central, but it appears that only one license can be granted legally. Last spring the commissioners instructed the owner of the British to make certain improvements. This was done and a license granted. There was some irregularity in the license and the matter was taken before Judge Crescor, who quashed the British license. This left the upper town without a licensed hotel. The Central proprietor then circulated a petition and secured a very large proportion of ratepayers' signatures asking the commissioners to grant a license to the Central. This the commissioners refused point blank to do and adjourned in order that the owner of the British might secure signatures. The commissioners met again at Holstein on Monday last to receive this petition but found that it contained but sixteen names, not nearly the required number, and a further adjournment for a week has been made. The people are largely in favor of the Central. It is hinted that the commissioners fear they will be nukted in damages if they heed the will of the people by granting the Central a license. It is hard to foretell what the outcome will be, but we would not be surprised to hear of the resignation of the three license commissioners for South Grey.
