place, aged 64 years, dropped dead in his
own stable. Deceased was an old resident
and much respected citizen. His remains
were interred at Ebenezer cemetery on
Wednesday, Rev. T. G. Scott officiating.—dStander.

The death occurred in Mount Forest

shortly afterwards and death resulted.

We are informed by the reeve that the
excavation at the horseshoe hill will be
so far advanced this week, probably on
Friday, that vehicles can go through even
when heavily loaded. The Dr. also
claims that our item referring to Mr. Mc-
Intyre's mishap at this point was mis-
leading. The Council did not agree to
pay the bill as there was no meeting of
the council, and what was said in refer-
ence to it was personal merely. Also the
cutting was only ten feet, not thirteen, as
we were misinformed. There are those
who say, too, that Mr. McIntyre's rig was
broken before it went into the hole. As
to the larger question of why this
job has not been sooner completed, we
are satisfied that the blame is attachable
somewhere but we do not propose to
place it. The desire of the council has
been to get the work done as cheaply as
possible or it might have been completed
before now. This, of course, is a laudable
motive, but it has operated against the
welfare of our business interests here to
a considerable extent. However, the
worst of the work is now over and
traffic will not henceforth be deflected or
impeded by the condition of the road.

The annual branch meeting of the
upper Canada Bible society held in the
Methodist church on Monday evening,
was poorly attended, as usually seems to
be the case in Flesherton. For some
reason little interest appears to be taken
here in this branch of the church work.
Perhaps we are all too busy propagating
creed and doctrine and spending all we
can afford in the dissemination of these
to the detriment of the spread of unadul-
terated gospel. Is it so, or is it pure care-
lessness and indifference that destroys
our interest. Be this as it may it appears
to be uphill work to persuade Flesherton-
people to take a deep interest in the work
of this society. Rev. R. Strachan of
Brookholm was present to plead for his
society. Rev. Mr. Darroch also spoke
for a few minutes. Mr. Strachan said
the Upper Canada society was the largest
auxiliary of the parent British and For-
eign Bible society which was inaugurated
in 1804. The parent society had itself
translated the Bible into 320 different
languages and published it in 381 languag-
es. The upper Canada branch was orga-
nized in 1828 and was then known as
the York Bible society. Under it were
now 584 branches and last year the in-
come from all sources was \$31,223;
24,300 copies of the Bible were issued.
