December Sessions

At 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon the December sittings of the general sessions of the peace were opened by His Honor Judge Cressor. The docket is exceptionally heavy. Of the total number of cases on the list nine are criminal prosecution and eight civil actions. Of the latter, two non-jury cases have been referred to His Honor Judge Morrison for trial. Four of the criminal charges are theft, two shopbreaking, one indecent assault, one receiving stolen goods, and one of pointing a loaded revolver.

The Judge's charge was brief and concise. After explaining to the jurors the nature of the evidence which would be submitted to them in the different cases, His Honor briefly commented upon the urgent necessity for the erection of suitable accommodation for the indigent poor of the County of Grey. Of the fifty prisoners at present confined in the county jail thirty-two had been committed for vagrancy, many of whom were wholly unable to do anything to alleviate their sad condition. It was high time that a house of refuge shall be built for the accommodation of these poor helpless people, and the jail used only for the legitimate purpose of imprisoning criminals. He thought he could properly recommend for their favorable consideration the plebiscite on the question which would shortly be submitted to the ratepayers of the county.

Queen v. Hall was the first case taken up, a true bill having been bro't in at the fall assizes. The prisoner W. W. Hall of Hopeville, was found guilty of the theft of certain tools which it was contended he had leased to J. A. McArthur of the same place. As it was purely a technical offense the judge did not send the prisoner to jail, but imposed a fine of \$25.00. A. G. McKay for the Crown, I. B. Lucas for the prisoner.

Struthers v. Simmers—An action for \$200 damages for inferior seed supplied the plaintiff, Robt. Struthers, market gardener of Owen Sound by the defendants, J. A. Simmers and Company, seed merchants of Toronto, is at present being heard. A. G. McKay for plaintiff; E. T. Malone of Edgar, Malone and Edgar, Toronto, and J. M. Kilbourn for defendant. Balance of report next week.
