Artemesia Council

The Municipal Council of the Township of Artemesia met in the Town Hall, Flesherton, on Friday, December 15, 1899. Members all present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of the last session were read and confirmed. Report of Mr. A. Muir, commissioner of Division No. 1, on expenditure 1899; report of G. Thompson on special expenditure on hill in concession 10, 30 sideroad; report of John Boyd on special expenditure on bridge at lot 180, Toronto line; report of G. Thompson on statute labor, Town line A. and E., and report of A. Muir on new deviation, Pricerville, were presented and read. By law No. 567, to open and establish a deviation of road on Lot 4, con. 1 S. D. R., was introduced and read a first time.

Muir—Boyd—That Bylaw No. 567, to open and establish deviation of road on Lot 4, Con. 1, S. D. R., be now read a second time.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—That Bylaw No. 567, be now read a second time.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—That Bylaw No. 567 be now read third time, signed, sealed and entered in Bylaw book.—Carried.

Muir—Boyd—That Joseph McDermald be refunded one dollar of taxes of 1899 on account of some of his village lots appearing twice on Collectors roll.—Carried.

Kells—Muir—That Jos. Blackburn be refunded \$4.50 of his taxes of 1899 on account of his protracted illness.—Carried.

Thompson—Boyd—That James Armstrong be paid \$27.00 being Township proportion of contract on Roy's hill.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—The account of D. McTavish for blacksmiths work and repairs to road grader, \$8.65, be paid.—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That John Watson be paid \$6.00, being payment for repairs to a bridge and two culverts in his road division as recommended by commissioners.—Carried.

Thompson—Muir—That John Weber be paid fifty cents for timber used in repairing bridge on Valley road.—Carried.

Thompson—Muir—That James Armstrong be paid \$1.50 for repairing bridge on Con. 10 at Lot 29.—Carried.

Muir—Boyd—That the account of R. McDowell C. E. for survey and plan of road deviation, Lot 4, Con. 1 S. D. R. \$10.50, be paid.—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That D. G. McLean account \$5cts for repairs to scraper be paid, also that W. J. Smyth be paid \$1.00 for Livery rig for committee re Ashdown Lawsuit.—Carried.

Thompson—Muir—That Hugh Walton be paid \$5.00 for building culvert on Meaford road, Lot 26, Con. 14.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—That Mary Martin be refunded one dollar of taxes of 1899 on account of error in assessment.—Carried.

Muir—Boyd—That the members of the local board of health for 1899 be paid \$4 each for their services.—Carried.

Kells—Muir—That the persons named be paid for gravel for roads as certified by overseers viz. James Hill \$1.40, W. Fisher \$1.50.—Carried.

Thompson—Boyd—That Robert Cooper be paid \$5 for repairing washout on 35 sideroad, Con. 13 and 14, as ordered by overseer and recommended by commissioner.—Carried.

Kells—Muir—That W. Boyd be paid \$12.12 as per account rendered for lumber supplied committee and used in completion of horse shoe hill job.—Carried.

Thompson—Kells—That collectors McCormack, Blair and Latimer, having completed the collection of taxes in the several divisions, they be paid their salary, \$25 each, and \$1 allowed them for postage as per bylaw.—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That the account of S. Sheardown for digging ditch be not entertained, as the same is not in accordance with bylaw.—Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That Mr. Thurston having completed his printing contract for 1899, he be paid the balance due him, \$15.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—That Geo. Moore be paid \$8.30 for gravel used on townline A. and P., and that Proton council be asked to pay to our treasurer one half of the amount.—Carried.

Kells—Muir—That Geo. Moore be paid \$3.55 for gravel used on road as certified to by overseer.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—That Wm. Caswell be paid \$30 for repairs to bridge at lot 180, Toronto line, as per report of committee.—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That Geo. Ludlow be paid \$4.12, being half cost of repairs to bridge on townline A. and P.—Carried. Boyd—Thompson—That John Madill be paid \$7.50, being half cost of repairs to bridge on townline A. and P. on gravel road south of Inistige.—Carried.

Muir—Thompson—That John A. Boyd be paid \$2 for letting and inspecting work of repairing bridge on Toronto line at lot 180.—Carried.

Muir—Kells—That G. Thompson be paid \$5.20 commission on \$65 expended on roads and bridges.—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That Messrs. Lucas Wright & Batson, solicitors, be paid \$167 being their fees and disbursements in the suit Ashdown v. Artemesia, and that the reeve's action in paying the amount of damages awarded, \$200, and the plaintiff's solicitors' fees and witness charges, \$73.26, be and is hereby ratified and confirmed.—Carried.

Muir—Thompson—That R. McGowan be paid \$125, being purchase money for deviation through lot 3, con. 1 S. D. R., and that the Clerk prepare a deed of the same and present to Mr. McGowan for execution.—Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That the report of A. Muir on the building of deviation at lot 4, con. 1 S. D. R., be received and

that the cost thereof, viz. \$32.45, be paid.—Carried.

Boyd—Kells—That A. Muir be paid \$7.00 for overseeing work and services on committee re McGowan's deviation.—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That the Reeve be paid \$2.50 for services on committee re deviation of road through Mr. McGowan lands.—Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That Mrs. Becrofts communication addressed to Mr. Boyd be laid over for future consideration the council not being in possession of all the road and fences mentioned.—Carried.

Thompson—Boyd—That in accordance with the offer of John Weber to pay expenses in connection with re surveying roadway opposite his property on condition that his fence is in its proper place the council to pay the expenses, be accepted and that this council proceed to have surveying done accordingly.—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That the application of Mr. John Weber, to have obstructions removed from Valley road at Lot 93, con. 14, be referred to Mr. Kells with a view of having same removed, the same to be let by public competition.—Carried.

Thompson—Kells—That the office of Geo. L. Latimer for the timber on East Street, Eugenia, be accepted, he agreeing to pay \$5.00 and to clear the timber off two rods of centre of said street.—Carried. Thompson—Muir—That the report of

the Police Trusters of Flesherton be received.—Carried.

Thompson—Boyd—That the report of committee on contract on Roy's hill be adopted and published with the minutes of council.—Carried.

Muir—Boyd—That Mr. Thompson wait upon Mr. Love with a view of settling the claim of J. B. Egan for damages to rig on road.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—That the Clerk acknowledge receipt of communications from P. McCulloch and J. B. Egan and state that council is giving the matters serious consideration.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—That Collector John Wright's time for return of his Roll be extended to the 8th day of January next, but nothing herein shall alter or affect his duties to return his roll or in any way invalidate the liabilities of his sureties.—Carried.

Kells—Boyd—That this Council hereby tender the Reeve, John McArthur, Esq., their sincere thanks for the impartial manner in which he has discharged his duties as Reeve of this Municipality for the year now about closing. This resolution was put by Councillor Thompson and carried by a standing vote.

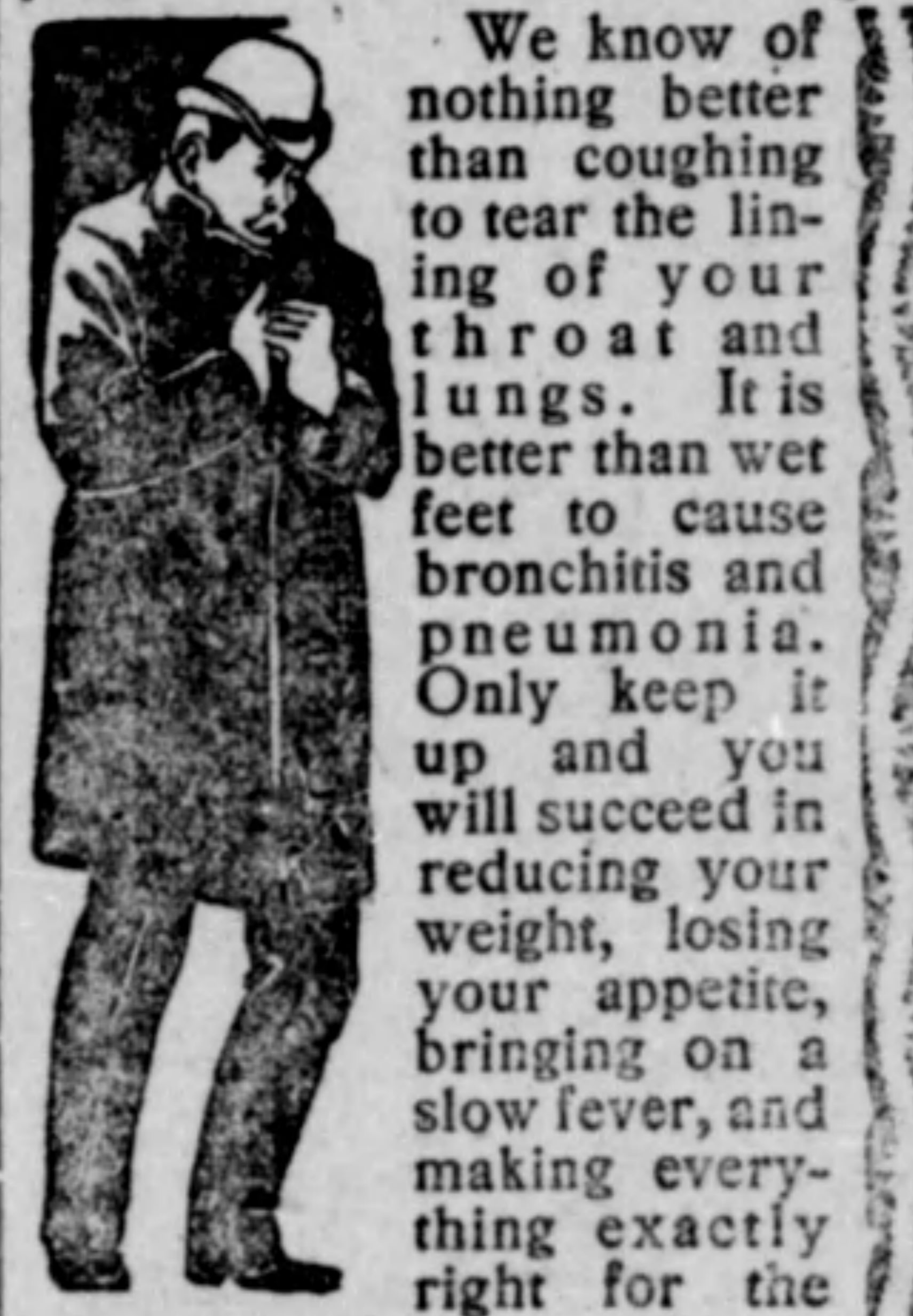
The Council adjourned.
