The C. P. R. could afford to pay more attention to the Owen Sound line. It's the best-paying bit of road in the whole C. P. R. system, but receives scant attention. Through trains, splendidly equipped, and sometimes with hardly any passengers, run twice a day from Montreal to Detroit. The local train is always side-tracked if there is any chance of it delaying the big flyer, and yet the local train is always full of passengers and frequently uncomfortably crowded. The service to Bolton fair on Thanksgiving Day was very bad, and coming back tonight there was simply no accommodation at all. Eight or nine hundred people stood waiting for the regular train to come along and when it came it was full already. The fair was over at five o'clock, but it was nearly nine o'clock before a train came and hardly a seat to accommodate the entire crowd. The train stopped and there was a rush to scramble on, or catch on somehow in the dark, when through the criminal carelessness of the engineer or conductor the train was pulled ahead without any warning. It was good luck that no one was killed, but the man who moved that train should be in jail or in a lunatic asylum. Of course all these people had return tickets, their money was paid and the Company let them take pot luck about getting back. In England light trains are run every hour on lines no so important as the Grangeville and the Owen Sound line. They are required to do so for the convenience of the public, but our railroads which we have really built with our own money are not run on that system. It is nearly time for a change.—Toronto Junction Leader and Recorder.
