Robert McKee Dead

Mr Robert James McKee, youngest son of the late John McKee, Flesherton, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Jeremiah Thompson, Collingwood, on Thursday, 11th inst., at the age of 62 years. Mr. McKee, who had not been robust for some years, suffered a stroke last winter from which he only partially rallied. His first wife was Miss Martha Thompson, who died twenty one years ago. About 8 years ago he married Mrs Amy Hill Thompson, who died four years later, leaving a little daughter, Hazel. He leaves four sisters: Mrs Rehill and Mrs Richard Pedlar, Winnipeg; Mrs Madill, Sault Ste Marie; and Mrs J Thompson, Collingwood; also two brothers, Patrick, of Nottawa and John of Port Arthur. Interment took place in Flesherton cemetery on Sabbath last, service being conducted in the Presbyterian church, of which deceased had been a life long member, by the pastor, Rev. F. G. Fowler. Service at the grave was conducted by the 4th Line Orange Lodge, of which Mr. McKee had been a member since early manhood.
