BOVINE DISEASE.—Dogs \$10 bills are in circulation. The counterfeit consists in a change which is effected by newly stretching or slitting away one half of the thickness of the bill; covering it and letting in (so to speak) with manila the words and figures, ten, from unconsolidated or other Bank bills. This patchwork fraud can be detected by holding the bill up to the light and by the small imprint of the figure "five" or whatever the actual denomination of the bill may be, on various parts of the bill.
