The Pacific Ocean Aflame

Ships in the neighborhood of the Sandwich

slands can now witness one of the grandest spectacles that earth affords. The Mauna Loa is again belching forth its fiery torrents. The mighty forces imprisoned under the beds of the Pacific are finding vent through this volcanie cone. Mauna Loa is a volcano situated on the island of Hawaii. It is 13,700 ters, one at the summit, and the other. Kilauea, at a somewhat lower level. This island these were exceeded in Angust, 1855, when the flew of fire, smoke, and lava continued until July, 1856. The evidence of this torrent was discovered for a distance of over sixty miles. The floor of the great crater Kilauea resembled, it was said, a lake of fire deep, and covered an area of twenty-eight square miles. This enormous vent relieves the great basin of the Central Pacific, the rim of which rests upon a volcanic formation set with volcanoes all around. It is notable light in the dark grey eyes and a more tender that most of the volcanoes are under the floor of the ocean, and only show themselves on islands cast up from the great deep. The land was under the surface of the water, and subject to volcanic action. It was the commingling of fire and water which one time or other distorted or depressed the surface of this earth. It calls attention to the Sandwich Islands, once populated by a race of handsome, simple-minded and half sighed; but very soon the white savages.
