The projected reorganization of the Spanish army will largely increase its numerical strength when it is fully mobilized. The infantry will comprise more than 210,000 trained men, while the other arms will comprise 100,000. The total strength of the Spanish army will therefore amount to over 300,000 men; whereas, as at present organized, its war establishment, including colonial troops, barely exceeds 200,000.

Vaccination as practiced in China has two peculiar features. The subject is not operated on in the arm or leg, but in the nose, and the Government, while it does not compel people to submit to the operation, practically enforces the same and that it would by doing so by offering to parents for every child vaccinated a premium of 100 copper cash, which amounts to about ten cents, and for a poor Chinaman in his own country, a sum not to be despised.
