Wm Miller, Bentinck tp. son of the John Miller who was accused of the murder of his wife last winter, has been found with an empty stomach. His body was found in a slushing, he had mangled with bloody wounds, and he was pierced with a bullet, his clothes being burned with the powder. At the request the particulars of the finding of the body were elicited, but nothing as to how Miller met with his death. Peter Weis, the father-in-law of the murdered man has been arrested. His old gun has been discovered wrenched to pieces, but having evidently been recently fired. Weis is a German, 60 years of age, and bears a bad reputation. A neighbour spoke the feelings of many when he said that it would be no loss if the Millers and Weises were wiped out. Three of Weis' daughters are under arrest,—one of them the victim's wife—and appear utterly indifferent as to their position. At the post-mortem examination by Dr. Thorsbury officiating, it was shown that the deceased came to his death by a gunshot wound having entered his back, passing through the lungs. Deceased was only about 27 years of age.
