FIRE ENGINE TO BE BOUGHT. FIRE COMPANY FORMED. THE VOLUNTEER BRIGADE.

On Friday evening last, a meeting was held in the Dufferin Hall, Markdale, for the purpose of considering the advisability of purchasing a fire engine.

Mr. Edward Davis, chairman of the fire committee, was elected to preside, and Mr. J. P. Brown was elected secretary.

Mr. Brown then proposed that a committee be appointed to select a site for the engine, and to estimate the cost of the same.

Mr. Brown then proposed that a fire company be organized, and that the necessary appliances be purchased.

This was seconded by Mr. Brown, who spoke of the advantages of such a company, and its great value to the village.

The chairman then called for volunteer members of a fire company, when some twenty-four names were handed in.

A meeting of the fire company was then called for the following Tuesday evening.

After a vote of thanks to the chairman, the meeting closed.
