### Extract from Act bearing on these Nuisance cases.

"The members of the municipal council, Township, Cities, Towns and incorporated villages the trustees of every police village shall be Health Officers sithin their respective muni cipalities under the next 5 sections this act; but any such council may by bylaw delegate the power of its members as such Health Officers to committee of their own number, or to such persons, either including or not ricluding one or more of the mselves, as the council thinks best.

The Health Officers of any Munnicipalities or police village, or any two of them, may in the day time, as often as they think necessary, enter into and upon any premises in the place for which they hold office and examine such premises.

If upon such examination they find that the premises are in a filthy or unclean state, or that any matter or think is there which is their opinion, may endangerthe public health, they or any two of them, may order the proprietor occupant of the prem ses to cleanse the same and to remove what is so found there.

Such Health Officers, in case the proprietor or occupier of the premises neglects or refuses to obey the directions may call to their assistance all constables and any other persons they think fit, and may enter on the premises and cleanse the same and remove therefrom and destroy what
