

EUGENIA.

(From our own correspondent.)

The T. G. & B. R. Ry is no longer
the ore-horse affair it formerly was.
We got on board the 6 o'clock express
on Tuesday, the 12th, and landed in
Toronto in good time. Then off went
the crowd to see the "lion." Here,
there is every conceivable plan to in-
duce you to spend your surplus dimes.
After going the round of the Zoo,
where you can see the identical whale
that swallowed Jonah, as some are
apt to tell you; then pass up the
street where you are invited to take a
throw at the genuine long lost Charley
Ross. Further on there is another at
the same ball game on a more exten-
sive scale. Then pass on and see all
the public buildings. On Wednesday
and Thursday you can step up to
Shaftsbury Hall and see Sir John,
(provided you are not a Globe report-
er); and lastly you can land at the
Police Court and hear the "Beak" ad-
monishing the crowd thus, "Go thy

we find the conductor and our old

out any serious accident.

The latest device for swindling is
under cover of an advertisement, "To
those just married or contemplating
marriage," promising to send for one
dollar, to any address, carefully sealed
and secure from observation, a work
which no newly married couple should
be without, etc. Hundreds of letters
came, each containing the letter. To
each address was sent a cheap Testa-
ment, costing, with postage, about 10
cents. And it would be hard to say
wherein he did not "fill the bill."

A Mr. Nowcker has asked the
Drayton New Era to state, for the in-
formation of the farmers, that it would
be to their own interest for them not to
thresh their barley until the cold weath-
er sets in—say the end of October
or the beginning of November—unless
it be of the very best grade. The reason
for this is because most of the barley
is discolored, and was gotten while it
was yet damp, and if it should be
threshed while it still retains moist-
ure it will most assuredly heat and
sprout, and thus be rendered useless,
except for pig feed; whereas, if the
grain is allowed to remain in the ear
for a month or two it will turn out
better and considerably improves in
color, and thus becomes a more mer-
chantable article. If this advice be
followed, and the barns wherein the
crop is gathered kept well supplied
with fresh air, probably the greater
part of the crop will not grade lower
than No. 2.

On Saturday week, on the 2nd con-
of Bruce, a new barn (the property of
Mr. N. McLean, raised on cedar posts,
the under part being intended for
sheds, etc.) fell over with a crash,
shattering the building into pieces.
Mr. McLean with three men and a
team had only just drove out of the
barn, where they had been unloading
grain, thus barely escaping with their
lives. A little two year old son of
Mr. McLean was playing in a buggy
under the barn at the time, but mir-
aculously escaped without injury, the
buggy body being all crushed into
pieces, truly the escape of the little
fellow was a miracle. There was also
a mare and colt under the barn, the
former was killed and the latter es-
caped without injury.
