

There has been many building improvements in our town of Markdale during the present season, none of which, however, have so far progressed as to be able to give an extended notice of their dimensions or appearance just yet. Mr. Reynolds' new dwelling is the nearest completion, and to it we wended our way a few days ago; and although put in a fit stage of completion to meet the eye of a connoisseur, yet the symmetry of the building cannot fail to arrest the eye of any lover of architectural beauty. Upon entering the building we found it encumbered with the debris of carpenters' and plasterers' business; but were at once struck with admiration at the neatly finished walls, which upon inspection with our non-critical view, we pronounced perfect, inasmuch as a straight level on a ten-foot wall, scarcely a sheet of paper could be inserted between. This is the true standard of workmanship, we believe. On the front of the building, upon both stories, there are two bay windows, and on a straight line with the main wall in the rear of these, is an arch, moulded in a mechanical and artistic style hitherto unknown in this section of country, and crowned with caps and corbels which would do credit to the skill of the Grecian masters of old, for their beauty of execution. The column supporting this arch is as true in its lines as though drawn by the rule of the limner. Credit must also be given to those who prepared the material, for a smoother surface we never felt upon a plastered wall. The work was done by Mr. Joseph Gibson.

In a short time the entire building will be ready for inspection, and we believe its appearance will tend to hasten many of the half-formed "engagements" now on hand, to a completion. Perhaps, more anon.

GLENELG FALL SHOW.

The morning was cool and dry, and the weather during the day was all that could be desired. At an early hour the various productions were coming in from all sides, and by eight o'clock the yard round the hall was thronged with vehicles bearing their products. The hall was fairly filled with the various articles comprising that department. The exhibit of fall wheat was large and of excellent quality. Spring wheat small and the sample under an average; barley, the same; peas, good; oats, fair; roots were generally good, especially potatoes, which were excellent. Fruit was of a very fine quality and a good display. There was bread and butter in abundance.

In the ladies' department the exhibit was well up and very creditable to the exhibitors. A fair display of fancy work was shown but scarcely up to previous years. On the whole the inside department was ahead of former years. Quite a variety of poultry was exhibited.

Horses—in this class there was a good show and close competition. Cattle were scarcely up to former years. Mr. Shepherdson, of Euphrasia, had a fine lot of sheep, otherwise we would have to report a falling off in this line. There were some very good swine. In manufactures we have to report a great falling off, owing, we presume, partly to exhibitions being held on each side of us the same day—Clarkson on the East, and South Grey at Durham. Those two doubtless had a serious effect on our show this year. Mr. Sarjeant had a patent load lifter which attracted the attention of many farmers, which he will also have on exhibition at Flesherston on Friday.

On the whole the exhibition was a success. The officers and directors did all in their power to give general satisfaction, and we compliment them on their efforts. The following is the
