ARTEMESIA COUNCIL.

Council met at Flesherton on Monday,  
4th Sept., 1882.

Present—Messrs. Christoe, (Recve.) Web-  
ster, Elliott, Wright and Pedlar.  
Minutes of August session read and con-  
firmed.

Communication from the Clerk of Proton  
read and referred to Mr. Wright.  
Account from John Boland, pathmaster,  
for removing large stones from road, present-  
ed and laid over; also accounts from Wm.  
Richardson for telegram, and from Regis-  
trar for registering deed, presented and or-  
dered to be paid.

By-law No. 343, levying school rates, was  
read a third time and passed. By-law No.  
346, to appoint the following Collectors for  
the following year, was introduced and pas-  
sed in the usual way.

Ward No. 1, John Hazard; Ward No. 2,  
Samuel Coleman, junr.; Ward No. 3, John  
Higginbotham; Ward No. 4, J. B. Sloan.  
Salary of each, \$24.

Geo. Simpson was refunded \$2, being  
statute labor charged which had been per-  
formed. James Genoe was paid fifty cents  
for repairing bridge on 25 sideroad.

A committee, composed of Messrs. Pedlar  
and Elliott, were appointed to meet a com-  
mittee of Euphrasia Council, (if appointed),  
in accordance with a petition of Jas. Stewart  
and others, to examine a proposed deviation  
on townline of Euphrasia and Artemesia.

FLESHERTON STATION.
