EUPHRASIA COUNCIL.

A meeting of the council of the township
of Euphrasia was held pursuant to adjourn-
ment on the 6th day of October, 1882.

Members all present. Minutes of last
session read and confirmed.

The Reeve and Mr. Eskine were appoint-
ed to examine the 11th line at lot 27, and to
take whatever steps in reference to the im-
provement thereof which they may deem
expedient.

Messrs. Erskine and Gilray were appoint-
ed to confer with the committee appointed
by the council of Artemesia, relative to the
deviation on the townline at the 4th conces-
sion of Euphrasia.

The sum of \$10 was granted for the im-
provement of the 11th line at lot 10, said
amount to be expended under the supervi-
sion of Mr. Erskine.

The sum of \$40 was granted for the im-
provement of 6 and 7 side line, on the 9th
and 10th concessions, said amount to be
expended under the supervision of Mr.
Elliis.

The Reeve's orders were issued on the
Treasurer for the following amounts:

To Robert Dunlop, Clerk, \$25, for prepar-
ing voters' list. John Ormsby, \$43.20, for
road work on 15 and 16 side road, con. 8.
James Stinson, \$20, for repairing Saugeen
bridge.

The Council adjourned until the first Fri-
day in November next.
