HOLLAND PLOUGHING MATCH.
The Holland ploughing match on the farm of the Reeve, W. Howey, Esq., on Tuesday of last week, was a decided success, notwithstanding that the number of entries was not as great as last year. The day was remarkably fine and the attendance very large, but the ground was rather too dry owing to the long continued drought. The judges were Messrs. Thos. Mitchell, of Sullivan, Neil McDonald, of Sydenham, and W. Foster, of Holland, and their decision gave general satisfaction. The judges, directors, ploughmen and a large number of visitors sat down to a splendid supper at Mr. Howey's after which the company retired to the parlor where a number of speeches were made and the various styles of ploughing discussed. Mr. John Marquis then took the chair, and Mr. John McDonald, of Chatsworth, on behalf of the managing committee of the ploughing match, presented Mr. Howey with a handsome driving whip as a slight token of their respect for him and in recognition of his services in making the match a success. Mr. Howey replied in feeling terms, and when referring to his contemplated removal to the North West in the spring and the severance of so many ties of friendship as that step would necessitate, was quite overcome by his emotions.
