

GREY ASSIZES.

The Assizes for the County of Grey opened on Tuesday, the 31st of October, before Hon. Mr. Justice Cameron. The docket was heavy both in quality and number. There are twenty-two civil records and nine criminal cases. Two civil cases have been settled. True bills were found by the Grand Jury against Samuel Carleton for the larceny of a saw from one Kennedy, in the township of Derby, and against Adam Minard for stealing a cow from James Millman, in the same township. Wm. J. Montgomery, et al v. John Hall, action of ejectment to recover possession of lot 9, on the south west side of Garafraxa street, in Owen Sound. Defendant claims by length of possession. John Cressor, Q.C., for plaintiffs; James Masson for defendant. The jury found against defendant. Hamilton vs. McNabb, a boundary fight from Derby township, was not finished when the court adjourned.

WEDNESDAY.

At the Grey Assizes to-day the following cases were disposed of:—Mrs. Ellen Hamilton v. George MacNabb. The plaintiff occupies the north half and the defendant the south half of part of lot four in concession one of Derby township, and the dispute is about the boundary line. Verdict for the plaintiff establishing the boundary she claims and giving her \$5 nominal damages. Mr. Masson for the plaintiff, Mr. D. A. Cressor for the defendant. Wm. H. Fawcett v. Mrs. Kerr.—This is an action for libel, the facts disclosed in which are somewhat extraordinary. The defendant is the mother-in-law of the plaintiff, and before the trial commenced the plaintiff's counsel, Mr. Pollard, offered to settle the suit if the defendant would apologize, withdraw the libel, and pay costs, as he was unwilling to drag family disputes before the public. This the defendant refused through her counsel, Mr. Moberley. The libel complained of is written on a post-card addressed to Mr. Richard Marsh, Meaford P. C., and is in the following words:—"February 8, 1882. I write these words to you that if you do not punish W. H. Fawcett for stealing grain out of your granery on October 26 I will punish you, for his wife can prove it, for this is what has made her without a house to-day. She never was brought up in that way nor was not going to live out her life in that unlawful way, and W. H. is the biggest bloot in the township." It bore the name of the defendant, Mrs. Kerr, but it was written by the plaintiff's wife with the authority of Mrs. Kerr. The plaintiff's wife had, at that time, been living apart from her husband since the previous October or November. Mrs. Fawcett is a young woman, and has been married only four or five years. She and her husband had two children. She suddenly left him and the children one morning without a word. Her explanation of this extraordinary conduct is as follows:—Her husband and Richard Marsh had been changing work backward and forward, and Fawcett was of opinion that Marsh owed him \$7 or \$8, but did not want to claim. Marsh was removing from that neighbourhood, and Fawcett said he would repay himself by taking grain from Marsh's barn. Mrs. Fawcett protested in vain against this, and shortly afterwards she saw Fawcett twice take an empty sack from his own barn in the direction of Marsh's and return with it full of something. Subsequently Fawcett told his wife that he had done as he said he would about Marsh's grain. Mrs. Fawcett gives this as the reason she left him, but in cross-examination it turned out that there was a further reason, namely, that Fawcett disapproved of a hat or bonnet that she had bought, thinking it too expensive, and told her to take it back and change it. This was three or four days after the alleged grain stealing, and Mrs. Fawcett admitted that if the bonnet matter had not occurred she would have overlooked the grain matter, and not have left her husband with two helpless little babies on his hands. The plaintiff when in the witness-box to-day denied the grain-stealing story in toto, and called as a witness Richard Marsh, who said that he had not missed any grain from his barn, and did not think any could have been stolen without his knowledge. The exasperation of the two women against the plaintiff appears to have been caused by Fawcett advertising after his wife left him that he would not be responsible for any debts contracted by her, as he found she had been buying property on his credit after she had left him. Another post-card of a still more injurious character was written to Marsh, but was not produced. An altercation took place between the parties outside the Court House this morning, in the course of which Mrs. Fawcett slapped her husband's face—with her gloves, as she explains. The jury found a verdict for the plaintiff, damages \$7.50. In the ejectment case of Cameron v. Cameron, a verdict by consent was taken for the plaintiff with costs.

THURSDAY.

The Assizes to-day opened with an action for slander, J. J. Middleton v. Joseph McArdle. The plaintiff resides in Dundalk, and has been reeve for Proton for several years,

also a magistrate, and a director of the Toronto, Grey & Bruce Railway. The defendant is the post master of the village of Hopeville, in Proton Township. The two are on the opposite sides of politics, and have generally been opposed in municipal affairs, and a bitter feeling appears to have existed between them for some time. This feeling broke out in an altercation between them in Gordon's Hotel, Dundalk. The plaintiff swears that during this altercation the defendant accused him of a most abominable and detestable crime, alleging that he could prove it. T. Hannen J. Hannen, and another man were present, and all three positively confirm Mr. Middleton's statement. For the defence Mr. McArdle admitted that he made a charge of the nature stated, but swore positively that he alleged it against some persons whom he understood were friends or relations of Middleton's. The thing appears to be based on some twenty years old story about some man in the neighbourhood of Rice lake. Verdict for the plaintiff; damages \$500. T. Hodgins, Q. C., for the plaintiff; Mr. Joseph MacDougall for the defendant. Thompson Ellis was indicted for rape upon Elizabeth Ann Smith in Bentinck on August 3rd. The girl Smith is of somewhat weak intellect, and the case was brought to a premature close by her answering "no" to the question if the prisoner was the man who committed the offence. Verdict, "Not guilty." True bills were found against John N. Snake and Charlotte Beatty in each case for perjury. The Grand Jury brought in their presentment. They expressed an opinion strongly in favour of the continuance of the grand jury system, in which view His Lordship concurred. Wm. Totten v. Jas. Sutherland.—Action to recover the price of a number of ties made by the plaintiff for the defendant in Keppel township. Unfinished. The court then adjourned until next Tuesday morning at ten o'clock.

OWEN SOUND, Nov. 5.—The propeller Josephine Kidd running between Owen Sound and Lion's Head was burned off Cape Commodore last night. She left here about eight o'clock in the evening with a full cargo of merchandise, including a large quantity of mill supplies for Lion's Head. After calling at Presqu'isle, where she took on board fifteen tons of hay, she proceeded on her way to Warton, thence bound for Lion's Head. When a few miles from Cape Commodore fire was discovered in the after cabin. Captain Thorburn first made an effort to extinguish it, but finding it gaining too much headway headed the vessel for shore, where they succeeded in beaching her. The crew attempted to use the pumps, but were driven from their posts. The ladies' maid had a narrow escape. The vessel and cargo are a total loss. The crew were all picked up safely by the steamer Myrtle, that happened to be en route from Warton to this place, and taken to Warton early this morning. The cargo is valued at upwards of \$4,000, and not insured. The Josephine Kidd is a small propeller of 108 tons burden, built at Port Stanley in 1879. She was owned by Kidd & Co., of Goderich, valued at \$6,000, classed A 2. She was insured, but at present the amount cannot be ascertained, nor the company.
