CHEAP GOODS.

Markdale has become noted for cheap merchandise and is drawing a trade from a great distance. Large numbers of strangers are in our village daily, many from a distance of 15 miles and upwards, and each week the number increases.

It is one of the best markets on the line of the T. G. & B. R., and has store-room for any quantity of grain. The very appearance of our large elevators give a favorable impression to strangers coming in, many of which remark, "this must be a good country or they would not require such large store-houses," and on leaving "we seldom strike a place of the size which does the amount of business." The two new elevators are now in full blast, which together with the sleighing the past few days has made quite a stir.

And now the question arises, how can we hold the large trade? The keen competition of our enterprising business men, together with the superior quality of work turned out by our mechanics, has been successful in drawing a trade, in many instances from a distance over bad roads. We believe the most efficient means of holding the trade would be to make good leading roads, and this is perhaps one of the most difficult matters we could deal with. We are situated at the corner of four townships—Artemesia, Glenelg, Holland and Euphrasia—none of which from past experience have sufficient interest here to induce them to do anything that would be for the benefit of Markdale, but rather the contrary. For instance, in Glenelg we have a bridge not half a mile out of the village on the most public road of the township which is in a dangerous condition, and though the officials have been requested and entreated to have it rebuilt they have treated us with indifference, while on the other hand when Durham wanted sidewalks the above township granted money for that purpose. We claim that the interest of the village and that of the surrounding country are identical, the more the village grows the more valuable the farms in the district become. It is just as desirable for farmers to have a good road to get to market as it is for the village, hence any means that may be adopted for the growth of one must be for the benefit of all. We invite discussion on the above from any one interested hoping that good results may follow.
