

**ARTEMESIA COUNCIL.**

Council met in the Town Hall on the 6th Nov.  
 Present—Messrs. Christoe, Wright, Elliott and Pedlar.  
 Minutes of October session read and approved.  
 Communications as follows presented and read:—H. Hooper re drains in Flesherton; the Clerk of O-prey re town line; Clerk of Euphrasia re deviation on town line; Beeve of Melanethon re drains, &c.  
 Accounts as follows presented:—William Strain, road scraper, \$70; S. Kingston, work on Boyles' hill, \$13.62; A. Elliott, expending special grant on town line Glenelg, and services on committee, \$8; Sparling Bros., repairing bridge, \$1.50. Selectors of Jurors, \$13; George Radey, repairing road, \$0c; A. R. Fawcett, printing, \$8. Payment ordered.  
 Report of committee on deviation on town line Euphrasia, presented and read.  
 By-law No. 347 introduced by Mr. Webster, and read a requisite number of times and passed.  
 That the report of committee on town line deviation, Artemesia and Euphrasia, as presented be adopted.  
 That Mr. Pedlar be appointed on behalf of this Council, to meet the Reeve of Euphrasia, and to co-operate with him in the matter of town line deviation.  
 That Alexander Neilson be appointed arbitrator for Artemesia, in the matter of certain drains heading into Artemesia, from the township of Melanethon.  
 That Sparling Bros. be paid \$1 for repairing bridge over Sauguen, near their mill on 12th con., and that John Howe be paid \$4 for removing stones from 12th con. But it shall be distinctly understood, that this Council will hereafter refuse to pay all, or any accounts, presented by any person or persons, except those authorized by the officers of the township having power to do so.  
 That James Neilson be paid \$20, amount appropriated to town line Artemesia & Proton.  
 That Oswald Walker be paid \$7, being half cost of covering Sauguen bridge, between Artemesia and Glenelg.  
 Council adjourned.

**FATAL ACCIDENT.**

**A EUPHRASIA MAN KILLED AT GRIERSVILLE.**

A sad and fatal accident occurred at Grierville on Tuesday afternoon or evening. Mr. John Bigham, who lived in the Township of Euphrasia near Rocklyn, was employed by Mr. Mitchell, of Grierville, to deepen an old roothouse. Mr. Mitchell and family were away from home during the afternoon when the accident happened and did not arrive home till evening. Mr. Mitchell after his arrival home, missed the old man, and went down to the roothouse to see if he were not coming to supper. He was horrified to find that the roothouse had collapsed and buried Mr. Bigham beneath the ruins. At once work was commenced to dig him out. The victim was found on one knee, with a rafter across the back of his neck. It is surmised that his neck was broken, for there was a breathing place leading directly from him to the outside, and he had not the appearance of a man who had been smothered. He was quite dead. Of course, no person can tell exactly just how the accident occurred, but it is conjectured that Mr. Bigham loosened the foundation in digging, with the above result. The weight on the roof, as those who know what an old-style roothouse is like will imagine, was considerable; on this one there was about 22 inches of earth. Mr. Bigham leaves two sons old enough to do for themselves, and a widow, who lives in Toronto. He was much respected by his neighbours, and was highly spoken of. He was aged 63 years.  
 Coroner Albery was notified of the accident, but, after consulting with Dr. Maclean, did not consider there was any necessity to hold an inquest.—*Mirror*.
