FLESHERTON CHEESE FACTORY.—A meeting of the patrons was held in the town hall for the purpose of winding up the business for the present season. The following is a condensed statement of the husiness for 1882:-The factory was opened on the 22nd of May and closed on the 28th of October. The total amount of milk furnished by the patrons was 446,669 pounds, making 44,272 pounds of pound. The total expenses for the season was \$1,227.24, leaving \$3,-527 to be divided among the patrons, or about 8 cents per pounds for the cheese after all expenses were paid. Some of the patrons received over \$25 per cow. This shows that cheese making is a paying business.—Com.
