FLESHERTON CHEESE FACTORY.—A meeting of the patrons was held in the town hall for the purpose of winding up the business for the present season. The following is a condensed statement of the business for 1882:—The factory was opened on the 22nd of May and closed on the 28th of October. The total amount of milk furnished by the patrons was 446,869 pounds, making 44,272 pounds of cheese, which was sold for \$4,754.24, or about an average of 10½ cents per pound. The total expenses for the season was \$1,297.24, leaving \$3,457 to be divided among the patrons, or about 8 cents per pound for the cheese after all expenses were paid. Some of the patrons received over \$25 per cow. This shows that cheese making is a paying business.—Com.

Flesherton.

Wright and Strain are making up a car load of poultry for Philadelphia.

Mr. Robt. Davis has accepted a situation as head book-keeper in a wholesale dry goods house in Atchison City, Kansas, and will enter upon his duties there early in January.

FINES.—A. S. Vandusen, medical prosecutor appointed by the Medical Association of Ontario, had a Mr. Snell, of Singhaupton, before a tribunal composed of Reeve Kirkland, Mr. Jas. Russell and Dr. McAllister, on Friday last, at Duntroon, on a charge of practising medicine without a license. Snell was fined \$25 and costs for his offence and was further fined \$10 and costs for assuming the title of "Doctor" without being legally entitled to do so. These are the lowest fines allowed by law, and certainly such offences deserve punishment.
