MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

To-morrow (Friday) will be nomination day and will decide who the candidates will be for municipal honors.

In Glenelg—the present Reeve will no doubt be elected by acclamation. Mr. Mullarky, the present deputy, and Mr. Glencross, councillor, are likely to be the candidates for Deputy Reeve, while the following names are mentioned as candidates for Councillors: Dunsmoor, Davis, Binnie, Neil, McMillan, McQuaig, and R. H. Boyce.

In Artemesia—Dr. Christie will be re-elected by acclamation. In Priceville ward Mr. Webster, the present deputy, will resign, and Mr. John McArthur will likely be elected by acclamation. We hear of no opposition to Mr. Wright in Flesherton ward.

In Holland—Mr. Cameron, the present deputy, will no doubt be elected Reeve, while the Deputyship will be between Messrs. Norton and Shute, both of whom have been councillors for many years.

Euphrasia is having a lively time already. Mr. Myles and Mr. Gilray are in the field for the Reeveship, while Messrs. Fawcett, Ellis and Erskine are candidates for Deputy, leaving vacancies for three new councillors.

Very little is said publicly in Osprey yet, but there is need of a change in some of the members of the present board.

In Proton it is thought J. J. Middleton will oppose the present Reeve.

ARTEMESIA COUNCIL.

This Council met in the Town Hall, Flesherton, Dec. 4th, 1882.

Members all present. Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

Communications as follows were presented and read:—S. Coleman, S. Cowan re Convention to be held at Orangeville, J. Masson asking Council to return S. Kelly his school tax of 1881, A. Nelson re drains, the Clerk of Melancthon re Arbitrator.

Accounts as follows presented and ordered to be paid:—R. J. Sproule, postage, \$1.70; S. Pedlar, services on committee, \$2; Mrs. Thompson, bread to Boyles and Taylor, two indigents, \$11.25; John Noble, repairing scraper, 75c.

Report of Committee on town line, Osprey and Artemesia, received and adopted.

By laws appointing deputy-returning officers and polling places, and to extend the time for return of the Collectors' roll until 31st Jan., were presented and read requisite number of times and passed.

A contract which had been let to one Chas. Ryan on the base line, not having been fulfilled, was cancelled, also the order to pay the same.

The taxes of Ann McKinnon, of Priceville, were ordered to be remitted, she being in poor circumstances.

Orders for payment of the Trustees rates in the different school sections were passed. Chas. Lamley was paid \$2, being balance of contract on town line, Glenelg, and Don. McDonald, 75c., repairs to the bridge in Priceville. Samuel Wauchob was paid \$11, being road job in Ward No. 3.

The Reeve and Deputy-Reeve were appointed to attend a convention in Orangeville on the 12th inst. Mr. Wright was appointed to represent this Council at the arbitration re drains from Melancthon at Dundalk on the 12th inst.

After the business of the year was finished the Reeve was requested to vacate the chair, when the following resolution was put and unanimously carried.

Mr. Webster moved, seconded by Mr. Pedlar, that the thanks of this Council are due and are hereby tendered to the Reeve, Dr. Christie, for the able and impartial manner in which he has presided over this Council during the year, and for the careful and painstaking manner in which he has discharged his duties as Reeve for the past year.

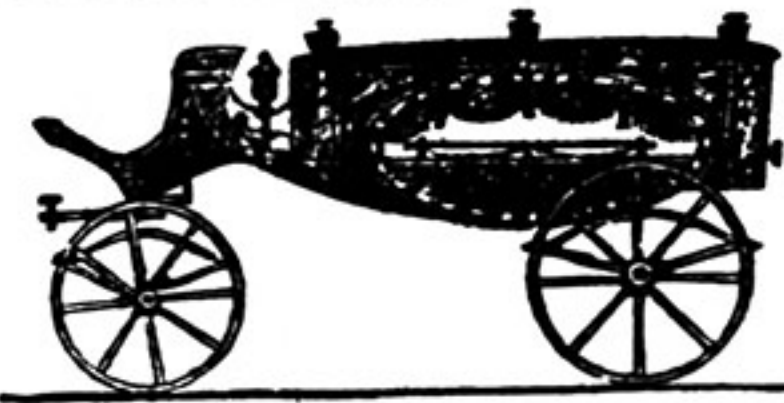
