To the Editor of the STANDARD.

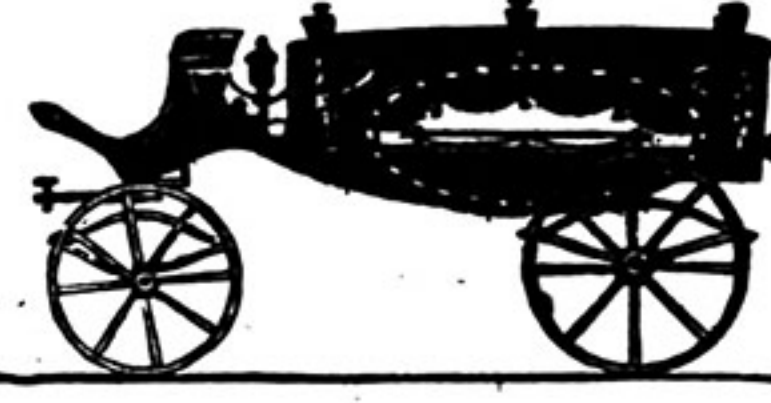
