PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH DEDICATION IN MARKDALE.

This church is built of brick, and is a fine specimen of architecture, being in an elevated position, fronting on George street. It is intended for a school and lecture room, (hence the plain finish,) but will be used as a church in the mean time.

On Sabbath, 31st Dec., according to announcement by advertisement and otherwise, the dedication services were held. Rev. Dr. Gregg, of Knox College, Toronto, preached in the morning to a large and appreciative audience, taking for his text the 5th chapter of Revelations and 6th verse. The Dr. is quite an aged gentleman, but retains the mental vigor of less advanced years; he has a clear voice and a good delivery, and preached a very instructive and interesting sermon.

There was also a good audience in the afternoon. Rev. Mr. McLeod who was to conduct the service being unavoidably detained, Dr. Gregg again preached, his text being the 5th verse of the 16th Psalm, giving a very interesting and profitable discourse.

In the evening the house was literally crowded, many not having room to sit, yet the best of order prevailed, when the Rev. D. McLeod preached an able sermon.

There was good music by the choir at each service. The collections of the day amounted to over \$53.

The tea-meeting, which was held on the evening following, was largely attended, the church being crowded to its utmost capacity. There was an abundance of eatables of excellent quality, the serving of which was no easy task owing to the immense throng. After nature's wants in this line were satisfied, the Rev. Mr. Wilson called the assembly to order, when a varied and interesting programme was gone through with. Space will not permit us to particularize. Good order was maintained throughout, and a pleasant and successful entertainment was brought to a close shortly after nine o'clock. Proceeds \$94, making over \$150 in all.

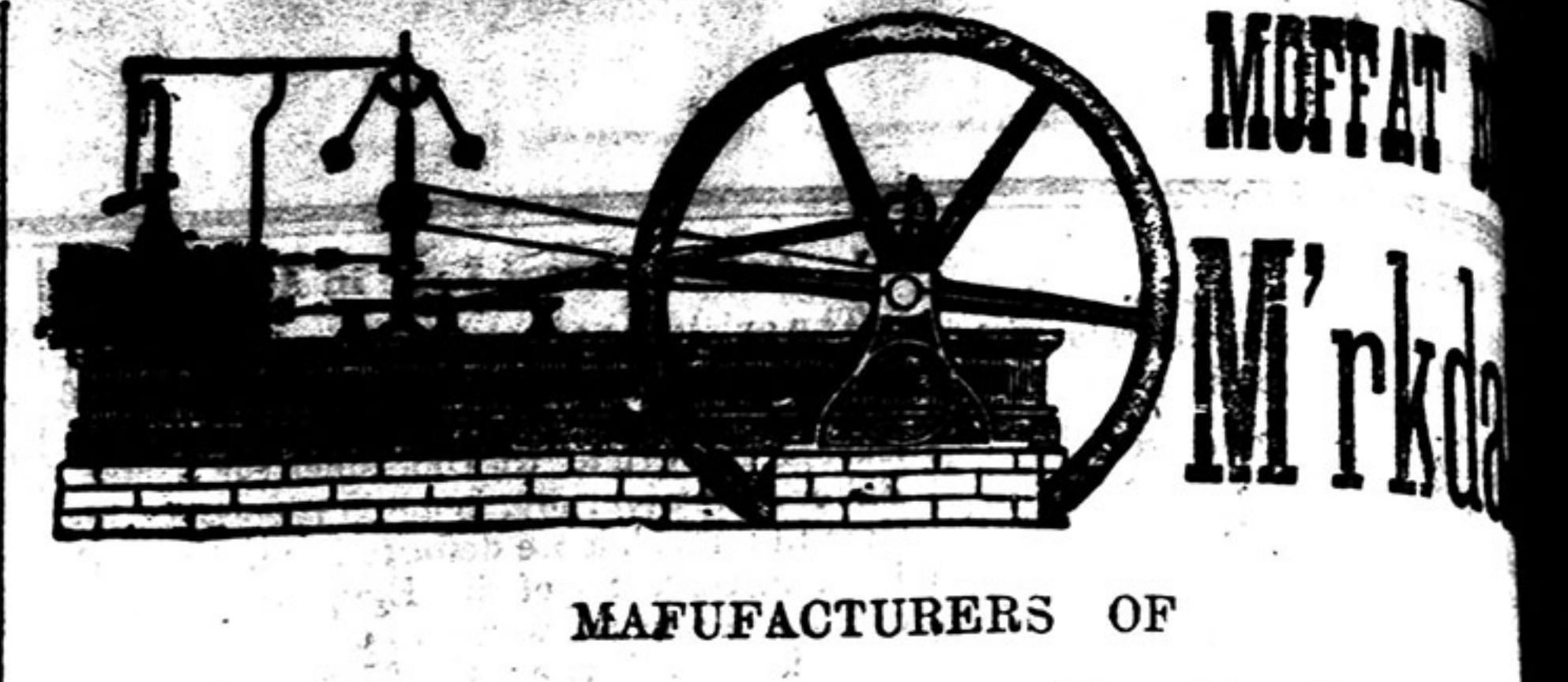
