**NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS.**

INTERESTING ITEMS GATHERED FROM OUR  
EXCHANGES AND OTHERWISE FOR THE

**Epping.**  
Mr. R. H. Stinson, of this village,  
has rented his blacksmith shop to Mr.  
Thos. Morrison, and goes to reside on  
a farm recently purchased by him on  
the 9th line of Euphrasia, three miles  
from Markdale. Prior to Mr. Stin-  
son's departure, the brethren of L. O.  
L. No. 899, Epping, testified to the  
esteem in which he is held by enter-  
taining him to any oyster supper. He  
has the good wishes of the whole  
neighborhood in his new home.

**Flesherton.**  
Mr. Roger Lever has purchased  
Mr. Wm. Cullen's farm for \$3,000.  
Mr. M. Richardson intends building  
a brick block on the corner where the  
Drug Store stands.

**EAST GREY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.**  
The above society met in the Town  
Hall, Flesherton, yesterday, Wednes-  
day afternoon. There was a fair at-  
tendance. Some matter of particular  
interest to the farming community  
were discussed in a very able manner.  
The question of most importance (in  
our opinion) discussed at the meeting,  
was that in reference to the advisability  
of farmers changing their seed grain  
periodically, and the best method of  
accomplishing so desirable an end.  
The matter was discussed very thor-  
oughly by Messrs. T. Kells, R. J.  
Sproule, S. Damude, J. Abbott and  
others. A motion by the president,  
Mr. Thos. Kells, seconded by Mr. M.  
Akitt, instructing the secretary to  
correspond with the secretaries of the  
various Agricultural Societies in Sau-  
geen District, asking them to co-  
operate with this (East Grey) Society in  
endeavoring to obtain assistance from  
the Government to introduce seed  
grain in large quantities into the lo-  
calities interested, and dispose of it  
in the usual manner, was put and  
carried unanimously. In our opinion,  
the Society deserves great credit for  
their prompt action in this important  
question. Thousands of dollars are  
annually lost in the county, through  
the inability of a great number of the  
farmers to change their seed.

Suggestions for certain changes in  
the prize list were then made, which  
will no doubt meet with due consid-  
eration at the hands of the directors.

The following were elected officers  
of the said society for current year:  
—Thos. Kells, President; J. Abbott,  
Vice-President; D. R. Ellis, 2nd Vice  
President; R. J. Sproule, J. I. Gra-  
ham, Auditors. S. Damude, Geo.  
Wright, J. Cameron, R. Oliver, R.  
Ruthven, S. Stocks, A. Munshaw, T.  
Ellis, A. McGirr, Directors. As a  
meeting of the Directors, Mr. S. Da-  
mude was re-elected Sec. Treasurer.

**Chatsworth.**

At the annual meeting of the Hol-  
land Agricultural Society on Thurs-  
day last the following gentlemen were  
elected officers for the ensuing year:  
President, John Marquis; Vice, W.  
R. Gibson; Directors, John Cameron,  
James Galbraith, A. McArthur, W.  
Foster, John Deavitt, W. Norton, G.  
Lee, Dan Taylor; Sec. Treas., W. G.  
Murray; Auditors, John McDonald,  
and Alexander Campbell. The audi-  
tors report showed some \$18 on hand.  
It was decided to limit the show to  
members of the township and exclude  
outsiders. This step is being vari-  
ously criticised, and is by no means  
approved of in this section of the  
township. It will certainly injure the  
show, which has always been looked  
on as one of the best in the county,  
and if the object of the change is to  
remove it to Holland Centre, as it  
would appear to be, there is reason to  
fear that it will kill it out altogether.
