ARTEMESIA COUNCIL.

The newly-elected council for the year 1883 met in the town hall, Flesherton, on 15th Jan., 1883.

Present—W. S. Christoe, M. D., Reeve; John McArthur, (Ward No. 1); A. Elliott, (Ward No. 2); T. Wright, (Ward No. 3); W. T. McKee, (Ward No. 4.) Councillors.

After each member had taken the necessary declaration of qualification and office they took their seats.

The next business was reading the minutes of December session, which were read and confirmed. Then the election of a Deputy- Reeve.

Wright, McArthur—That Mr. A. Elliott be Deputy- Reeve for the current year, which motion was carried unanimously.

A letter from Mr. Webster, Pricville, re contract let to Chas. Ryan, was presented and read.

A petition from John McAllear re honor and burial of James Lyons, an indigent, was presented and read, which could not be entertained.

Report and award of arbitrators on the drains from Melancthon, presented and read.

Accounts as follows presented, read and ordered to be paid:—H. Hooper, coffin for D. Smith, an indigent, \$5 50; S. King-ton, digging grave for same, \$1.50; A. R. Fawcett, printing, \$4; Robt. Carruthers, holding poll Ward No. 4, \$5; W. J. Bellamy, quarter salary, &c., \$12; Thos. Quigg, kindling for hall, \$2.20; T. Hutchinson, repairing bridge, \$1.50; T. Wright, attending arbitration re Melancthon drains, \$3; Jerry Thompson, error in school assessment, \$1.60; Alex. McIntyre, for arrears of taxes paid in error, \$2.

Mr. Wm. Brown, of Markdale, was selected by the Reeve as his choice for auditor, and Mr. C. C. James, of Pricville, as the choice of the Council. Mr. John Whitty was appointed

assessor, and by-laws were passed confirming above appointments.

Council adjourned to meet on the first Monday in February, 1883.

GLENELG COUNCIL.

The newly elected council met at the town hall on 15th inst. pursuant to statute.

Dunsmoor, Mullarky—That Mrs. Tuohy be refunded taxes which she paid in error for the year 1879, amounting to \$9.25, and that Mrs. Priel be refunded her taxes for 1882, amounting to \$6.05—carried.

Mullarky, McMillan—That the Reeve, Mr. Davis and Mr. Dunsmoor be appointed a committee to report on the Treasurer's surties—carried.

McMillan, Dunsmoor—That the Clerk be instructed to furnish a list of road deviations at next meeting, showing titles if any—carried.

McMillan, Mullarky—That the following accounts be paid:—

J. Townsend, printing, \$6.50; Rowsell & Hutchison, election blanks \$5.50—carried.

Road Commissioners were appointed as follows:—Ward No. 1, T. Davis; Ward No. 2, J. A. McMillan; Ward No. 3, P. Mullarky; Ward No. 4, N. Dunsmoor.

Dunsmoor, Davis—That \$8 be paid T. & J. Brown for repairing road scrapers, per order of John McInnis, pathmaster—carried.

Dunsmoor, Davis—That John S. Black be authorized to repair the windows of the town hall and paint the sash, the cost not to exceed \$2 50 and the work to be completed before the 12th of February next—carried.

Council adjourned to meet at the same place on 12th Feb. next.

Shute, Deavitt—That the following widows be exempted from taxes:—Widows Caesar, Graham, McDiarmid, Chambers, Matthews, McGregor, Jackson, and James Robinson.

Council adjourned until Feb. 14th, then to meet at Vogau's hall.

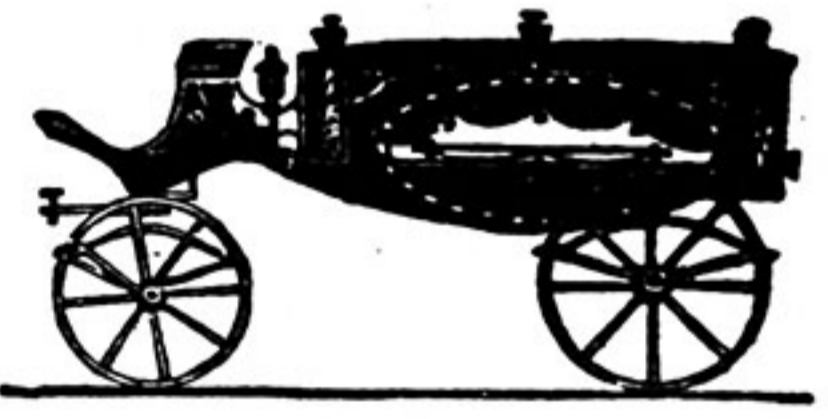
