property in the country, or they could
not get through their work in five
years; he thought work should be
done by examining in a more general
way, and then revising the assess-
ment roll of each municipality.
Mr. Blyth supported the By-law
and said the legal question was of
small account. He thought it was
not at all necessary to have a town-
man as valuator, as an intelligent ex-
perienced farmer could estimate the
value of town property. He declared
the impossibility of the Finance Com-
mittee settling the matter fairly—how
could a man 50 miles away give an
intelligent vote on the value of the
township where the Reeves and De-
puty Reeves of that township and the
next one would dispute the value to
the extent of \$8 or \$10 an acre?
Mr. Bowes thought Messrs. Myles,
Reid and Murdoch were just as good
men as could be appointed, but he
would certainly oppose what appeared
the illegal action of appointing
Council members as Valuators.
Mr. Dunnington was against the
By-law because of its illegality, but
criticized the action of Messrs. Chis-
holm and Christie as appearing will-
ing to swallow the illegal point if they
only got their man appointed instead
of one of the names on the By-law.
Mr. Stark said that if the By law
were quashed, it would only cost a two
days' session to meet and re-enact it.
He thought they should go ahead.
Mr. McKechnie wanted to see
Messrs. Myles and Murdoch act as
Valuators; but he wanted to see the
appointment made legally, and so
would oppose the third reading at this
session. He still thought some man
should be Valuator who understood
thoroughly the value of town prop-
erty. He would oppose Dr. Christie's
amendment.
Mr. McIntyre wished the matter
could be settled by the Finance Com-
mittee—if there were only honest
enough in the Council to decide fairly.
Mr. Frost thought that the Valua-
tors might go too far in examining
each lot by itself—the main thing
was to grasp an idea of the value of
the land as a whole. Reporting under
oath did not seem to him a guarantee
of even and fair justice, because men
were naturally prejudiced in favor
of the townships that they had repre-
sented and worked for so long, even
if they desired to do justice to all.
They would probably expect to be
elected again when the work was done,
and they would want to do work that
would give satisfaction to their own
constituents. If they really acted
fairly, they would be likely to be de-
feated—such things had occurred in
the past, and might again.
The amendment was then put and
lost by 14 to 21.
Mr. McKechnie moved, seconded by
Mr. —, That the third reading of
the By-law be deferred till the next
meeting of the Council.
Messrs. McRae and Christie sup-
ported Mr. McKechnie's amendment,
because the appointments could be
legally made at the next meeting, and
the council could not expect the Valua-
tor's report by the June session, any
way, so that this Council would lose
nothing by deferring the matter.
Mr. Blyth said just the same argu-
ments were being gone over now that
were advanced yesterday, and the
only object of those who supported
the present amendment, was to put it
off altogether.
Mr. McKechnie's amendment was
then put and lost.
