MR. ANDREW MELDRUM.
AN ARTEMESIA BOY "STRIKES ILL" IN COLORADO—A REPUTED MILLIONAIRE.

Mr. Andrew Meldrum, a son of Mr. Henry Meldrum, the well-known Flesherton Station Agent of the T. G. & B. R., and a blacksmith by trade has "struck ill" in a Colorado silver mine. Mr. Meldrum and three other gentlemen, commenced prospecting among the mountains of Colorado in the summer of 1881. They met with very little if any success, until about the 12th of August in the same year, when he and Robinson, one of his partners—while "prospecting" in the Red Mountains, found indications that led them to stake out a claim now known as the Guston mine. They staked out another mine a short distance from the "Guston," and called it the "Yankee Girl." The latter mine proved so rich that on the 17th of September they took one thousand dollars worth of ore out of it. A company of Americans offered them \$125,000 in cash for the Yankee Girl, and they accepted. Mr. Meldrum and his partners still hold the Guston mine, however, which is said to be enormously rich in precious metals. In fact it may be stated that Mr. Meldrum is worth a round million dollars!—Advance.

[The above gentleman while visiting his sister, Mrs. Alex. Kay, of this village, gave us a call on Tuesday last. His speedy occasion to wealth has not changed his manner in the least, being still reserved and unassuming in his deportment. He showed us a map, or draught of his "Guston Mine," showing the tunnel through which the ore is brought, the camp built of logs with a chimney of silver ore, a blacksmith forge built between two trees, the forge also built of silver is worth \$1,000, itself. Mr. Meldrum being a blacksmith, keeps the mining tools dressed and sharpened. He has with him specimens of Silver and Gold ore, which appear very rich in these precious metals. He leaves this week for Chicago where he will remain until spring when he will return to Colorado.]

GLENELG COUNCIL.
Council met at the Town Hall, on the 12th inst. Members all present. The committee on the Treasurer's sureties presented their report which was adopted.

McMillan, Mullarky, that the pathmasters be instructed to be more particular in performing their duty in removing all obstructions, including fences on the highway—carried.
Davis, Mullarky, that the Auditors report for 1882, as finally audited by the Council, be adopted and that the clerk be instructed to get 200 copies printed in pamphlet form—carried.

A By-law was passed appointing pathmasters, fence-viewers and pound-keepers.
Davis, McMillan, that the following accounts be passed:—C. W. Rutledge, printing, \$3.75; Rowsell & Hutchison, municipal blanks, \$18 09; Thos. Lauer, Registrar's fees, \$1.00; N. McIntyre, delivering ballot boxes for two years, \$10.00—carried.

Mullarky, Dunsmoor, that \$20.00 be paid Michael Cummins for injuries to his horse caused by a defective bridge at Barrhead Mills—carried.
Davis, Mullarky, that J. S. Black be paid \$2.50, for repairing the Town Hall—carried.

McMillan, Dunsmoor, that widow Sinclair be granted \$5.00 as charity, she being in indigent circumstances—carried.

Mullarky, Davis, that Miss Neathercot receive \$3.00 as charity—carried.
Davis, Mullarky, that a committee be appointed consisting of the Beeve and clerk with instructions to secure the best titles they can to road deviations in the Township, and that said committee be empowered to make any arrangement to secure such titles as they deem best in the interest of the Township and report at the October meeting—carried.

Council adjourned to meet at the same place on 4th June next.
