MILWAUKEE HOTEL FIRE.

THE LESSEE OF THE BAR-ROOM INDICTED FOR ARSON.

MILWAUKEE, Feb. 26.—The grand jury have indicted Schiller, the former lessee of the bar-room of the Newhall house, for arson. The indictment charges the prisoner with wilfully, maliciously, and feloniously setting fire to and burning the Newhall house on the night of January 10th, causing the death of a number of persons. Counsel insisted upon his immediate arraignment, and Schiller was taken to court this afternoon almost unobserved. He pleaded not guilty, and was re-committed in default of \$10,000 bail. The grand jury are still considering the responsibility of the owner and manager of the hotel. It is believed indictments for manslaughter will be returned against Nash, Antisdell, and the night clerk, De-laney.
