The want of a thoroughly trained fire brigade in Markdale is apparent to all. While some appear to think very little could be accomplished without an engine, we are of opinion that a well trained company, with a hook and ladder outfit would do as much, if not more, in nine cases out of ten, to saye property and extinguish a fire in a place like Markdale, than would be done with such an engine as this place could afford to procure. The corpor ation could grant sufficient to purchase a hook and ladder outfit, and no ratepayer would feel the cost, while the prompt and well directed efforts of an efficient and trained body of men would no doubt be a great improvement on the present state of things. We would like to see our Village Police give some assistance in the matter. Of course there is no encouragement to form a company without the co-operation of the authorities.

THE RAIL WAY GOBBLE.

In another column we give a clip from the World of Saturday last intimating that arrangements are in progress whereby the Grand Trunk is likely to control the Northern, Hamilton & Northwestern and T. G. & B. Railways. Should such arrrangements be completed, the question will very naturally arise, what will be the result? The Grand Trunk would then control four points on the Georgian Maj. for Creighton 155. Bay, viz; Collingwood, Meaford, Owen Sound and Wiarton, We believe this (the T. 
