THE NEXT GOVERNOR-GENERAL.—It is currently reported at Ottawa that Right Hon. W. E. Forster, late Chief Secretary for Ireland, is to be the new Governor-General, in succession to his Excellency the Marquis of Lorne.

The worst freshets ever known in Nova Scotia have just occurred in that province, involving the destruction of an immense quantity of property. The lowlands in many districts are submerged, and bridges and railway tracks have been swept away. So far, fortunately, no loss of life is reported.

METHODIST UNION.—The returns of the voting on the question of the union of the Methodist Churches so far as completed show that 595 quarterly meetings have declared in favor of the union and 75 against it, while there are ten tie votes. The analysis of the voting in the different conferences is as follows:—Toronto, yeas 207, nays 16, ties 3; London, yeas 205, nays 22, ties 1; Montreal, yeas 107, nays 25, ties 4; Nova Scotia, yeas 30, nays 9, ties 1; New Brunswick, yeas 43, nays 1, ties 1; Newfoundland, yeas 3, nays 1. There are still 100 meetings to hear from.

OUR HARBOR.—As a first fruit of the recent deputation to Ottawa, H. A. Gray, Esq., of the Public Works Department, accompanied by Mr. Temple of the T. G. & B. R., arrived in town on Friday night last, and on Saturday morning commenced taking soundings of the river, to ascertain definitely what is required to be done, so that an estimate of the cost can be made. The deputation was favorably received, and there are good prospects of the dredging being continued the coming season.—O. S. Times.

We learn that the American hotel is about to change hands, Mr. Lesslie having taken one of the principal hotels in Napanee, and will move there in a few days. He leaves with the good wishes of a large host of friends in town and country. He has sold out his business here to Messrs. Primmer & Graham, both well known in connection with the T. G. & B. R., and they will take control of the American on his leaving.—O. S. Times.
