The fine plate glass windows in Stephen's bardware store and Creighton Bros. dry-goods store were completely destroyed, and considerable damage was done to the stocks by fire and water. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

Further, in ref. erence to butter I will quote Observer's own figures. He says there is about 30,000,000 pounds of butter marketed in Ontario annually, on this he seems to put a discount of five to ten cents per pound on account of it being home made. Now Sir, while I repudiate the idea of any man trying to establish it as a fact that we have no good butter makers in the country. I am well prepared to give such statement a flat denial.
